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Purpose

The Council is responsible for:

1. Providing leadership to, and advocacy on behalf of, the people of Hamilton.
2. Ensuring that all functions and powers required of a local authority under legislation, and all decisions required by legislation to be made by local authority resolution, are carried out effectively and efficiently, either by the Council or through delegation.

Terms of Reference

1. To exercise those powers and responsibilities which cannot legally be delegated by Council:
 - a) The power to make a rate.
 - b) The power to make a bylaw.
 - c) The power to borrow money, or purchase or dispose of assets, other than in accordance with the Long Term Plan.
 - d) The power to adopt a Long Term Plan or Annual Plan, or Annual Report.
 - e) The power to appoint a Chief Executive.
 - f) The power to adopt policies required to be adopted and consulted on under the Local Government Act 2002 in association with the Long Term Plan, or developed for the purpose of the Council's governance statement, including the 30-Year Infrastructure Strategy.
 - g) The power to adopt a remuneration and employment policy.
 - h) The power to approve or change the District Plan, or any part of that Plan, in accordance with the Resource Management Act 1991.
 - i) The power to approve or amend the Council's Standing Orders.
 - j) The power to approve or amend the Code of Conduct for Elected Members.
 - k) The power to appoint and discharge members of committees.
 - l) The power to establish a joint committee with another local authority or other public body.
 - m) The power to make the final decision on a recommendation from the Parliamentary Ombudsman, where it is proposed that Council not accept the recommendation.
 - n) The power to amend or replace the delegations in Council's *Delegations to Positions Policy*.
2. To exercise the following powers and responsibilities of Council, which the Council chooses to retain:
 - a) Resolutions required to be made by a local authority under the Local Electoral Act 2001, including the appointment of an electoral officer and reviewing representation arrangements.
 - b) Approval of any changes to Council's vision, and oversight of that vision by providing direction on strategic priorities and receiving regular reports on its overall achievement.
 - c) Approval of any changes to city boundaries under the Resource Management Act.
 - d) Adoption of governance level strategies plans and policies which advance Council's vision and strategic goals.

- e) Approval of the Triennial Agreement.
- f) Approval of the local governance statement required under the Local Government Act 2002.
- g) Approval of a proposal to the Remuneration Authority for the remuneration of Elected Members.
- h) Approval of any changes to the nature and delegations of the Committees.
- i) Approval of all Council and Committee Advisory Groups and their terms of reference.
- j) Appointments to, and removals from, CCO CCTO and CO boards;
- k) Approval of proposed major transactions or constitutional adjustments of CCOs, CCTOs and COs.
- l) Approval or otherwise of any proposal to establish, wind-up or dispose of any holding in, a CCO, CCTO or CO.
- m) Approval of city boundary changes, including in respect of Strategic Boundary Land Use Agreements.
- n) Approval Activity Management Plans.

- *Delegations to Positions Policy*
- *Elected Members Support Policy*
- *Significance and Engagement Policy*

No members of the Council declared a Conflict of Interest.

No Members of the public wished to speak.

5. Confirmation of the Council 2021-31 Long Term Plan Budget Deliberations Open Minutes of 9 and 10 December 2020

Resolved: (Cr Wilson/Cr Bunting)

That the Council confirm the Open Minutes of the Council Long Term Plan Budget Deliberations Meeting held on 9th and 10th of December 2020 as a true and correct record.

6. Chair's Report

The Chair spoke to her report noting the process to be followed during this meeting.

Resolved: (Mayor Southgate/Deputy Mayor Taylor)

That the Council:

- a) receives the report;
- b) approves Cr O'Leary's request to step down as a member of the Central City River Plan Advisory Group due to workload constraints; and
- c) approves Cr Naidoo-Rauf and Cr van Oosten be appointed to the Central City and River Plan Advisory Group.

Cr Forsyth joined the meeting (9.39am) during the discussion of the above item. She was present when the matter was voted on.

7. Draft Revenue and Financial Policy and Consultation Document and other supporting financial policies

The Financial Controller introduced the report, outlining the purpose of the Revenue and Financing Policy, Funding Needs Analysis, Rates Remissions and Postponements Policy, Funding Impact Statement and Rating Policy. Staff responded to questions from Elected Members concerning removal of the Hamilton Gardens Targeted Rate and the Compliance Targeted Rate.

The discussion of the above item 7 (Draft Revenue and Financial Policy and Consultation Document and other supporting financial policies) was adjourned enable questions to be responded to by Audit NZ.

8. Draft Development Contributions Policy 2021/22

The Growth, Funding and Analytics Unit Manager outlined the staff report. He noted that staff were advised after this agenda was published of a required revision to the industrial and the commercial 'transport factor' which is used in the DC model and which has an effect on industrial charges and a minor effect on some other charges. They explained that it caused a negligible (less than 0.01%) impact on DC revenue. They confirmed that the schedule of charges in the draft policy

and the consultation document was to be updated ready for community consultation.

Staff responded to questions from Elected Members concerning proposed changes to the draft policy, residential charges in Greenfield cells, infill infrastructure, and the calculation model.

Staff Action: *Staff undertook to organise a session of the Development Contributions calculation process prior to the adoption of the 2021-31 Long Term Plan.*

Resolved: (Mayor Southgate/Cr Wilson)

That the Council:

- a) adopts the draft Development Contributions Policy 2021/22 (**Attachment 1** of the staff report) and the draft Development Contributions Policy Consultation Document (**Attachment 3** of the staff report) for community consultation, alongside the draft 2021-31 Long-Term Plan; and
- b) notes that community consultation on the draft Development Contributions Policy 2021/22 will take place from 5 March 2021 to 7 April 2021;

They then responded to questions from Elected Members concerning the debt to revenue ratio, personnel expenses, the proposed rate increase, the audit review process, and the Long Term Plan timeline.

Staff responded to questions from Elected Members concerning details of the consultation document including links to the funded and unfunded projects, park space on the Founder Theatre site, the Gully Restoration options, paid commuter parking options, and the expanding hillcrest library option.

The meeting was adjourned 11.31am to 12.10pm during the discussion of the above item.

Cr Forsyth re-joined the meeting during the above adjournment.

Consultation Document:

- i. Page 22 and 24 add the following wording - For more information about work happening on Intersections across the city, go to futurehamilton.co.nz/fundedprojects;
- ii. Page 34 update the map to reverse the shading to make it more obvious it is the area between the central city boundary and the dotted line;
- iii. move these words from page 34 to page 35 - This revenue would go towards public transport and mode-shift initiatives which provide opportunities for people to get to and from work without needing their cars;

- iv. Page 35 Option 1 add the following words - Because the revenue generated would be spent on public transport and mode-shift initiatives, this option has no impact on rates. The spending will result in better alternatives for commuters coming into the central city. Rates impact to be changed to \$0;
- v. Page 35 – Option 2 replace the text with the following - This option does not introduce parking charges around the fringe of the central city and means we would not be able to spend the proposed revenue on additional public transport or mode-shift initiatives.
- vi. Page 45 add the following wording - \$4 million in 2021/22 to fund Council's preferred option to demolish the Founders Theatre building and create a new vibrant park space (in line with our West Town Belt Masterplan);
- vii. Page 51 Option 1 replace 'services and facilities' with 'the things that make visiting the gardens easier and more accessible';
- viii. Page 51 - Option 2 Replace the second sentence with 'This means we will have \$250,000 less to spend on the things that make visiting the gardens easier and more accessible but does not impact the overall Hamilton Gardens Development Plan';
- ix. Page 57 Option 1 replace 'with less funding in the first five years' with 'with the majority of the spending in the last five years of the plan';
- x. Page 57 Option 2 replace 'spreads the spending evenly across the next 10 years' with 'brings some spending forward from the last five years to the first five years of the plan'
- xi. Page 57 Option 2 add the following wording and delete the second paragraph 'Although the rates impact for both options appears the same, this is based on an average across 10 years. Under this option, we take on debt sooner, which means we'd be closer to our debt-to-revenue limit in the first five years';
- i. Page 74-75 Looking beyond bubble map the orange bubble containing the text "Public transport improvements \$41m" will be moved from indicating as beginning in 2026 to 2021/22 to reflect that there will be public transport improvements undertaken from that year;
- ii. Pages 19,30,39,45,55 make the text referencing the full list of projects (funded and unfunded) orange;
- iii. Change all references to 'compliance targeted rate' to 'government compliance targeted rate';
- iv. Update the options tables in the consultation document to use the word 'invest' or 'investing' rather than 'spend' or 'spending';

Submission Form

- v. Throughout the submission form change the word 'spending' to 'investing' and 'spend' to 'invest';
- vi. Priority two, Introduce paid commuter parking around the fringe of the central city Option 2: change text to – 'Keep as is which means we will not be able to spend the proposed revenue on additional public transport or mode-shift initiatives';
- vii. Priority four, Charging for car parking at Hamilton Gardens Option 1: change text to 'Charge \$5 for cars and \$20 for tour buses to park at Hamilton Gardens to generate \$500,000 to improve the things that make visiting the gardens easier and more accessible';
- viii. Priority four, Charging for car parking at Hamilton Gardens Option 2: change text to 'Keep as is and have free parking at Hamilton Gardens which means we will not be able to further improve the things that make visiting the gardens easier and more accessible';
- ix. Priority five, Gully restoration Option 2 change text to 'Speed it up by still investing \$29 million but investing more in the first five years and less in the last five years than under option 1';
- x. Add Heading under the last block of 'Anything else you want to tell us?';
- xi. Add extra text - We have lots of other projects included in this Long-Term Plan. We

want to hear your views on any of these projects. You can see the full lists at futurehamilton.co.nz;

- e) approves staff to commence formal consultation on the draft 2021-31 Long-Term Plan from 5 March 2021 to 7 April 2021;
- f) notes verbal submissions on the draft 2021-31 Long-Term Plan will be heard by the Council on 13, 14 and 15 April 2021; and
- g) notes deliberations on the feedback from formal public consultation on the draft 2021-31 Long-Term Plan are scheduled on 4-5 May 2021 and that 6 May 2021 will be reserved as a back-up day for further deliberations should this be required.

Item 6

Consultation on our draft 2021-2031 Long-Term Plan ran between 5 March and 7 April. We received 5,674 responses on the draft Long-Term Plan itself; 62 responses on our proposed Development Contributions Policy; 19 responses on the proposed Growth Funding Policy; and 41 responses on the Revenue and Financing Policy. We also held numerous events around the city engaging with different sectors of our community, and engaged digitally, through social media and video conferencing. Public engagement is important to me and I am pleased to see a greater number of citizens engaging in this Long-Term Plan than ever before.

I, like my councillor colleagues, are now going through the consultation responses to see for ourselves what Hamiltonians think of our plans for our city. There will be strong feelings from all sides on different issues, and it is our job to consider them all.

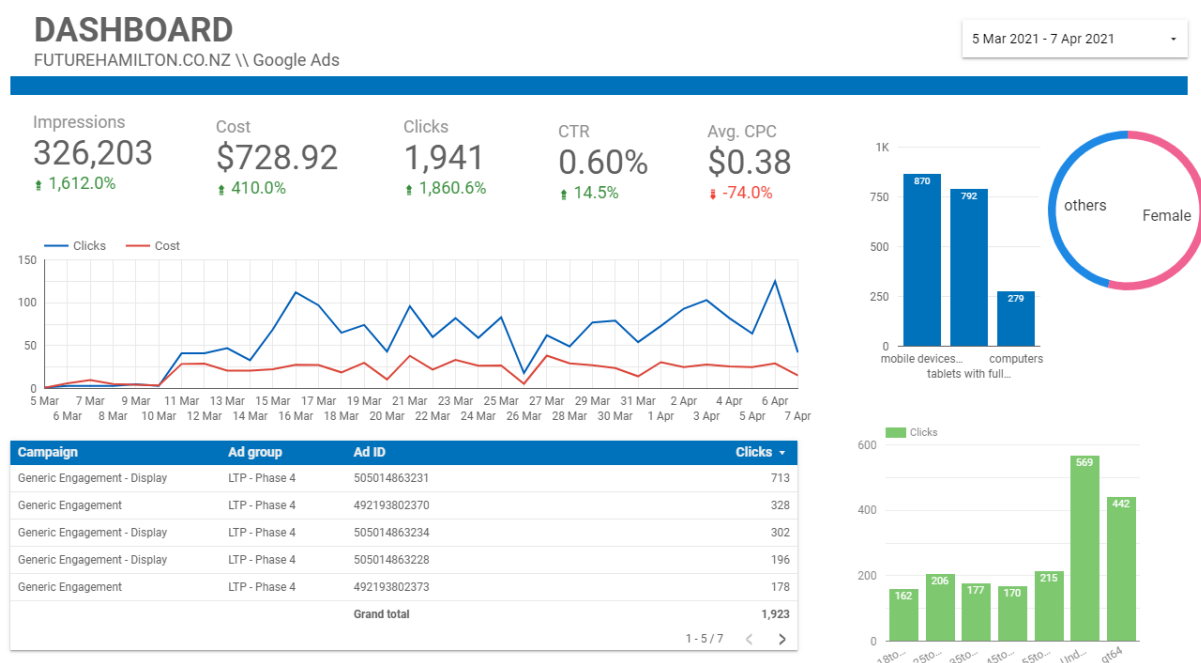

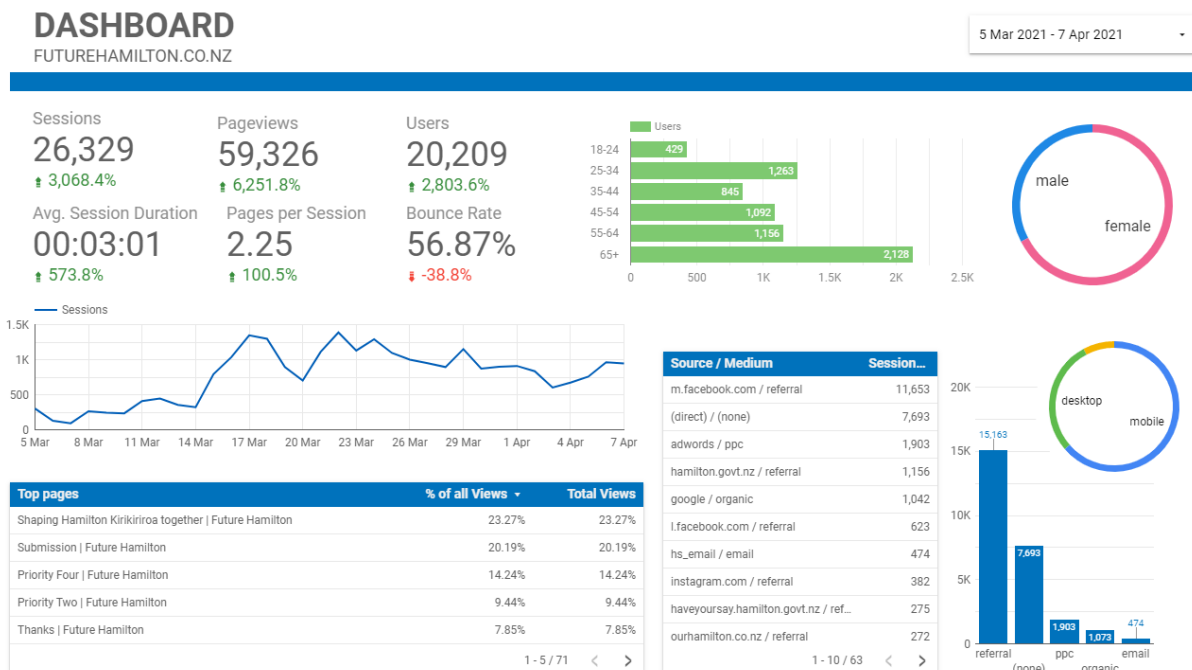

23. The highest performing ad sets on social media were Priority 2 – Commuter Parking and Priority 4 – Parking at the Gardens.
- Commuter Parking ads drove 1,162 clicks through to futurehamilton before it was turned off at the request of Councillors (active from 5 March to 24 March). The new ad which replaced it drove 71 clicks through (active 24 March to 7 April).
 - Parking at the Gardens ads drove 2,867 clicks through to futurehamilton before it was turned off at the request of Councillors, this was our highest performing ad across the campaign (active 5 March to 29 March). The new ad which replaced it drove 1688 clicks (active 29 March to 7 April).
 - A generic ad set was created on 22 March to specifically target underrepresented locations. This campaign included generic messaging and the five priority videos. This campaign resulted in a total on 108 clicks through to the website.
 - A generic LinkedIn campaign was run from 5 March to 7 April which reached 13,930 users and drove 102 clicks through to futurehamilton.co.nz
24. As a result, the futurehamilton web was opened 26,329 times by 20,209 users. The statistics of the futurehamilton site are listed below:

26. Report Status	<i>Open</i>
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Purpose - *Take*

1. To provide the Council a summary of the submissions received on the Draft Development Contributions Policy 2021/22 (draft Policy).

Staff Recommendation - *Tuutohu-aa-kaimahi*

2. That the Council:
 - a) receives the report;
 - b) notes that feedback will be considered during the deliberations on the Draft Development Contributions Policy 2021/22 at the 4 to 5 May 2021 Council meeting; and
 - c) notes that the Development Contribution Policy 2021/22 will be considered for approval at the 24 to 25 June 2021 Council meeting.

Executive Summary - *Whakaraapopototanga matua*

3. At the 25 February Council meeting, Council adopted the Draft Policy for consultation alongside the Long-Term Plan. Consultation ran from 5 March to 7 April 2021.
4. There were 62 submissions to the Draft Policy.
5. From the responses received, there were 37 submitters who identified as individuals and 25 who identified as representatives of businesses and other organisations.
6. Through the consultation, Council asked targeted questions to gather feedback on the proposed changes to the Policy, in addition to welcoming feedback on any aspects of the policy.
7. Overall respondents supported the following proposals:
 - continuing the CBD remission
 - introducing a 100% remission for buildings 6 or more storeys in the CBD
 - introducing a 100% remission for registered social housing providers
 - introducing a cap on non-residential DC charges

- phasing the transition to higher residential DC charges
8. Respondents were evenly split about the inclusion of community infrastructure in residential DC charges.

 10. The opportunity to present a verbal submission to Council was requested by 26 respondents from a range of organisations.
 11. Council's current DC policy is the subject of a judicial review, with a hearing set down for April 2021. A decision on the judicial review is not expected until around July 2021. Decisions by the Court may impact the current policy review and need to be addressed after the decision is received.

Background - *Koorero whaimaarama*

12. At the 25 February Council meeting, Council adopted the draft Policy for consultation alongside the Long-Term Plan. Consultation ran from 5 March to 7 April 2021.
13. Key amendments to the existing Policy, approved by Council for inclusion in the Draft Policy were:
 - extending the 66% CBD remission until 30 June 2024;
 - introducing a 100% remission for buildings six storeys or more in the CBD until 30 June 2024;
 - including recovery of Community Infrastructure projects in residential DC charges;
 - introducing a 100% remission for registered social housing providers, and charitable trusts providing social housing;
 - capping non-residential charges at \$20,000 for industrial; \$30,000 for commercial; and \$40,000 for retail per 100sqm; and
 - phasing the transition to higher charges in new and developing growth cells over three years.
14. Staff have read all submissions to the draft Policy and have identified key issues from these submissions in this report.

Submission Themes

15. Submissions on the draft Policy can be complex and technical. This report attempts to summarise them by theme. This summary is not intended to provide detailed summaries which may detract from the full submissions, but instead provide a reference to help understand how an individual submission fits within the broader feedback received.

Proposed amendment 1: Continue the CBD remission

16. Submissions strongly supported the continuation of the CBD remission. Those in favour commented on how it helps to support density and aligns with the vision for a vibrant CBD.
17. Those that opposed the proposal generally commented that development should not be subsidised and should pay its fair share for the demand it places on the network.
18. The community was also asked whether there should be criteria to meet in order to receive the remission. There was overall support to additional criteria. Suggestions for criteria included:
 - the inclusion of LifeMark design principles;
 - an increase in the requirement for trees on sites;
 - alignment with the Climate Change Commission recommendations;

- design criteria and a priority for aesthetics and benefits for the wider community; and
- maintain a level of urban activity in the city between demolition and construction.

Proposed amendment 2: Introduce a 100% remission for 6 or more storey buildings in the CBD

19. Submissions mostly supported the proposal to introduce a 100% remission on 6 storey or higher buildings in the CBD. Those in favour stated that the proposal fit with the city's vision, however, a number commented that there should be criteria to meet. Suggested criteria included LifeMark 4 certification, ensuring quality and generally aligned with feedback on the proposed amendment 1.
20. Those that opposed the proposal mostly thought that growth should pay for growth and were against remissions generally.

Proposed amendment 3: Include community infrastructure projects in residential charges

21. Submissions evenly split on the proposal to include community infrastructure projects in residential development contributions charges. Respondents commented that these costs should be covered by rates and that DC charges were already very high.
22. Those that supported the proposal saw it as a fair way of distributing the costs of community infrastructure and a way of avoiding building new growth areas without community facilities.

Proposed amendment 4: Provide a 100% remission for registered social housing providers

23. Submissions mostly supported the proposal to introduce a 100% remission for registered social housing providers and charitable trusts providing social housing.
24. Those supporting the proposal stated that supporting social housing within the city was important.
25. The submissions opposed to the proposal stated that irrespective of the social use, it is still growth and Council should not be subsidising social housing.
26. The community was also asked whether any criteria should be met for a provider to be eligible for a remission. A number of criteria were proposed including:
 - LifeMark 4 rating;
 - increased green space;
 - minimum time as social housing; and
 - align with Climate Change Commission recommendations.

Proposed amendment 5: Cap non-residential charges

27. Submissions strongly supported the proposal to put a cap on non-residential development contributions charges.
28. Some respondents suggested that there should be criteria for developments that receive capped charges. These criteria included LifeMark 4 ratings, positive environmental initiatives, and employment benefits for the city.
29. Those opposed to the proposal stated that Council should not be subsidising growth.
30. Some respondents suggested this measure would not be needed if DCs were fair and equitable as required under the legislation.

Proposed amendment 6: Phased transition to higher charges

31. Submissions mostly supported the proposal to provide a phased transition to higher development contributions charges for new growth areas.
32. A number of respondents saw this proposal as being good for development in areas that council wants to prioritise. Charges were seen by this groups as high and allowing developers to plan ahead was seen as a positive.

33. Some submissions suggested that LifeMark 4 ratings should be a requirement for developments to qualify.
34. Those who opposed the proposal generally thought that development should not be subsidised by the rate payer. It was suggested that this makes the policy more complicated to understand.
35. Some respondents suggested this measure would not be needed if DCs were fair and equitable as required under the legislation.

Other matters outside of the proposed amendments

36. Many other issues were raised through the consultation. Some of the more common themes were:
 - Council has proposed to update its transport demand factor in the DC model. Some submitters challenged this proposed change, and others said the Council should review all the demand conversion factors used in the DC model;
 - Council's cost allocations methodology ([see here](#)) is not fair and equitable;
 - Council's growth projections are wrong and/or infrastructure investment misaligned with that growth;
 - frustration with the DC remission process including concerns with how actual demand remission assessments are made;
 - that greenfield development is subsidising infill development;
 - requested the introduction of new development types (warehouse/low use and retirement); and
 - gross floor area definition.

Legal and Policy Considerations - *Whaiwhakaaro-aa-ture*

37. The LGA provides the legal and statutory framework for preparing and adopting a DC policy. All decision-making must adhere to this framework.
38. Council has taken external advice and are satisfied that this report complies with the Council's legal and policy requirements of the Local Government Act 2002 and specifically s82 Principles of consultation.
39. As Elected Members have been advised, Council's current DC policy is the subject of a judicial review, with a hearing set down for April 2021. Decisions by the Court may impact the current policy review, including a requirement to amend the policy. Updates, including any impact on this policy review, will be provided at the earliest opportunity. Until that time, the Council is advised that it that should continue this policy review process as it normally would, while taking legal advice to ensure Council's legal position is not compromised.
40. A decision on the judicial review is not expected until around July 2021. This would preclude those judicial decisions being included in the current policy review process, which concludes its public consultation and anticipated adoption before then. Again, staff will update Council as the process continues.

Wellbeing Considerations - *Whaiwhakaaro-aa-oranga tonutanga*

41. The purpose of Local Government changed on the 14 May 2019 to include promotion of the social, economic, environmental and cultural wellbeing of communities in the present and for the future ('the 4 wellbeings').
42. During the development of the Draft Policy, Council considered the impact on the social, economic, cultural and environment wellbeing of the community.

43. The consultation and verbal submission process will allow staff to listen to the views of the community and how these proposed changes could affect their wellbeing. These views will be considered when we evaluate any changes to the Policy.

1. To provide the Council a summary of submissions received on the Draft Growth Funding Policy.

Staff Recommendation - *Tuutohu-aa-kaimahi*

2. That the Council:
 - a) receives the report;
 - b) notes that submissions will be considered during the deliberations on the Draft Growth Funding Policy at the 4-5 May 2021 Council meeting; and
 - c) notes that a Growth Funding Policy is to be considered for approval at the 24-25 June 2021 Council meeting.

Background - *Koorero whaimaarama*

3. At the [25 February 2021](#) Council meeting, Council adopted the Draft Growth Funding Policy (draft Policy) for consultation alongside the 2021-31 Long-Term Plan and the Development Contributions Policy review. Consultation ran from 5 March to 7 April 2021.
4. The proposed amendments to the existing Growth Funding Policy were minor and were:
 - make it clear that Council is open to discussing potential IFF proposals before they go to the Government;
 - include reference to the NPS-UD and related Unfunded Growth Projects;
 - address changes to the purpose of local government (the four wellbeings);
 - refer to the Operative District Plan, Future Proof and the Hamilton Urban Growth Strategy;
 - leverage strategic planning including the Hamilton-Waikato Metro Spatial Plan; and
 - align strategically to the draft 2021-31 Long-Term Plan Growth Principles, the draft Financial Strategy and the draft Development Contributions Policy.
5. Staff have read all the submissions to the draft Policy and have summarised them in this report.

Submission overview

6. There were 19 submissions in total on the draft Policy – being 14 online submissions and five letters.
7. Of the responses received 13 submitters identified as individuals, and six as representatives of businesses and other organisations.
8. Through the consultation, Council asked targeted questions to gather feedback on the proposed changes to the Policy.
9. Overall, the proposals were well supported.
10. The table below shows the breakdown of those that supported and opposed each amendment.

Amendment B	Including NPS-UD	12	1
Amendment C	Updating purpose of local government	9	5
Amendment D	Updating references to District Plan	13	0

11. A data storage issue meant the responses for Amendment E were not collected for nine of the respondents. All these people have been contacted and invited to provide a response if they wish. To date, five people have replied, and their responses have been included in this report.

13. Eight respondents requested the opportunity to present a verbal submission specifically on the Growth Funding Policy to Council.
14. The five letters received did not address the Growth Funding Policy in isolation – they also spoke to the 2021-31 Long-Term Plan and related draft policies.

Other matters outside of the proposed amendments

15. All five letters from developers asked that the Growth Funding Policy be repealed as it was an impediment to development and growth.
16. Those respondents have indicated that they wish to present to Council on this matter.

Legal and Policy Considerations - *Whaiwhakaaro-aa-ture*

17. Staff confirm that this report complies with the Council's legal and policy requirements of the Local Government Act 2002 and specifically s82 Principles of consultation.

Wellbeing Considerations - *Whaiwhakaaro-aa-oranga tonutanga*

18. The purpose of Local Government changed on the 14 May 2019 to include promotion of the social, economic, environmental and cultural wellbeing of communities in the present and for the future ('the 4 wellbeings').

19. During the development of the draft Policy, staff considered the impact on the social, economic, cultural and environment wellbeing of the community. It is proposed that the 4 wellbeings be included in the Policy from 1 July 2021.
20. The consultation and verbal submission process will allow staff to listen to the views of the community and how these proposed changes could affect their wellbeing. These views will be considered when we evaluate any changes to the Policy.



