# Chair's Report

Kia ora Taatau,

This is our 7<sup>th</sup> meeting of our District Plan Review Committee. It is an appropriate time to take stock of some of the ground we have covered to date, to review our scope and to check we are united in terms of strategy going forward in quite an uncertain external environment.

It will be no surprise that the passing of Luke personally and professionally has impacted the pace of the work we have been undertaken. Staff have been resolute to honour the work he was leading and collaborate with our internal and external personnel, skills and resources to continue this vital work however it is fit that we pause and assess;

- What's been achieved so far
- The scope of the programme check that all understand what is being undertaken and the final destination
- Emerging questions or issues (e.g. existing operative DP provisions for intensification, future role
  of urban design panel, sequencing/prioritisation of area plans)
- We are still on target to notify the plan change this time next year (Sept 2022)

The elephant in the room for me is having a clear understanding of how we meet the requirements of the NPS-UD. More explicitly what would be the minimum threshold in terms of density or unit numbers? How can we deliver on a vague target AND simultaneously deliver on the indelibly interconnected impact on existing (and need for upsize capacity) infrastructure. We know the funding of infrastructure is already a very challenging issue NZ wide but we can't possibly address the funding challenge if we don't have a clear understanding on the step change demand this type of infill pressure will create.

We have been able to advance aspects of this process through both formal resolutions and via a level of informal workshopping and this seems to have been working really well. We will continue this format at this meeting with staff and key advisors/legal to talk through these matters after the formal reports have been considered.

- Outcomes from this meeting/workshop will be reported back to the next meeting and will also determine and shape work programme for the next 12 months
- Engagement with the community has started with the stakeholder webinar that took place in early September and was attended by more than 160 people with really positive and appreciate feedback thus far.
- Citizen Panels recruitment is under way and workshops are expected to start in late-September.

# **Executive Summary - Whakaraapopototanga matua**

- 3. This report provides updates to Committee Members on aspects of the District Plan Change Programme (DP Programme) for which the Programme Manager and the General Manager Growth have responsibility, including but not limited to:
  - i. Communications and engagement;
  - ii. Programme scope and progress against schedule;
  - iii. Infrastructure implications;
  - iv. Emerging issues;
  - v. Risks; and
  - vi. Financial considerations.
- 4. Staff consider the decisions in this report have low significance and that the recommendations comply with Council's legal requirements.

# Background - Koorero whaimaarama

- 5. On 8 December 2020, Council approved the formation of the District Plan Committee, to provide and approve broad strategic direction to inform and guide the development of the District Plan amendments programme of work. The Committee's terms of reference were subsequently approved on 4 February 2021.
- 6. The remaining meeting dates for 2021 for the District Plan Committee are:
  - i. 4 November
  - ii. 15 December.
- 7. Should the District Plan Committee request more meeting dates and times, staff will work with the Governance Unit to accommodate new or revised changes to the schedule.

# Discussion - Matapaki

### **Communications and Engagement**

- 8. A key aspect of the District Plan Change Programme (DP Programme) is to ensure that Council engages effectively with impacted communities and stakeholders. This engagement is required by the Resource Management Act (RMA) prior to notifying any amendments to the District Plan.
- 9. As a growing city, we need to plan so Hamilton develops the way our community wants, as well as meeting the new requirements set by central government. Shaping a city and doing it well can only be done together with people who live here and by working with groups that have a stake in our success.
- 10. A Communications and Engagement Advisor has been contracted to deliver the communications regarding the programme with the support from the Council's communications and engagement team and the programme manager.
- 11. A comprehensive communications and engagement strategy, which also includes a separate but related tangata whenua engagement strategy, underpins the DP Programme.
- 12. The key messages and techniques for engaging the community were approved by the District Plan Committee at their May 2021 meeting. The resolutions from that meeting were approved by Council on 10 June 2021.
- 13. Further, a report was tabled at the 12 August Council meeting outlining the planned engagement activities for August-October 2021.

#### **Communications**

- 14. Proactive media briefings and the release of area plan information took place in August 2021, resulting in coverage in the Waikato Times and New Zealand Herald.
- 15. A webpage has been created to provide background to the project and reflect what is now out in the public realm: <a href="www.hamilton.govt.nz/itsourplace">www.hamilton.govt.nz/itsourplace</a>. This continues to be updated.
- 16. Posts on social media (LinkedIn and Facebook) on Council channels and by Elected Members have gathered lots of interest and discussion.
- 17. A process has been set up to address public queries and a database established for ongoing updates.
- 18. Planning continues for heritage and biodiversity workstreams.

#### Stakeholder engagement

19. A stakeholder webinar took place in early September 2021, which was attended by more than 160 people. Stakeholders were asked to provide issues and opportunities to be considered as part of the programme following the webinar.

#### Community engagement


- 20. Recruitment for Citizen Panels is under way and workshops are expected to start in late-September.
- 21. Heritage and notable trees correspondence continues to be monitored and addressed as required.

# Tangata whenua engagement

- 22. An approach has been made to Hukanaui Marae to host taangata whenua and Iwi Maaori workshops. It is anticipated that workshops will be similar to the stakeholder workshops. It is likely to occur on a Saturday to allow most whaanau and rangatahi to attend.
- 23. Updates will continue to be provided to taangata whenua groups via email.
- 24. Wikitoria Tane (Waikato-Tainui) has supported the continued work of the NPS-Car Parking programme.
- 25. An internal workshop was delivered to Plan Change Programme staff and contractors, providing context to Treaty Settlement mechanisms that apply with Council.

### Programme scope and progress against schedule

26. The entire programme consists of 4 tranches. While Tranche 1 has been formally underway since the start of the financial year (ie since 1 July 2021), staff have been working since January 2021 on preparing the programme management plan, scoping the individual projects that make up the programme, and contracting specialists to assist the workstream leaders.



- 27. Tranche 1 will result in notifying a plan change (Plan Change 12) by September 2022. This will give effect to the National Policy Statement Urban Development (NPS-UD), which requires identifying new areas for greater urban regeneration at a scale and extent materially different from current settings.
- 28. Tranche 2 then begins; RMA Schedule 1 statutory timeframes apply, ie 20 working days for submissions after the plan change is publicly notified, followed by a further 10 working days for further submissions once the summary of submissions is publicly notified.
- 29. Tranche 3 is the period when submissions and further submissions are heard by independent RMA Commissioners, who then release their 'Decisions'. Tranche 4 consists of appeals to the Environment Court, including mediation.
- 30. The simple graphic below shows where we are currently in the Schedule 1 process:



# Tranche 1 scope and deliverables

31. Tranche 1 consists of 9 projects, each with its own milestones and budget:

i.	'Super' Plan change 12	Drafting guides, templates, and overview to ensure cohesive drafting across the different chapters and topics. Includes 'rest of city' intensification response	
ii.	Plan Change 9*	Identify and schedule built heritage, Maori sites of significance and all archaeological sites; reassessment of existing scheduled trees

- 32. Ruakura rezoning is in the scope of this programme; however, it is being funded by Tainui Group Holdings and managed by an external consultant so sits outside the Council's project management system.
- 33. Specific deliverables for Tranche 1 are:
  - i. New areas of the city are rezoned for intensification;
  - ii. Plan changes 8, 9 and 10 (these previously underway projects will be included in Plan Change 12);
  - iii. New areas are identified for biodiversity protection;
  - iv. Revised parking standards;
  - v. Implementation of a housing strategy requirement for more affordable housing in the city;
  - vi. Climate change assessment; and
  - vii. Infrastructure needs and triggers, and water allocation needs and triggers.

# Fairfield-Enderley Urban Development Partnership

- 34. At the Strategic Growth Committee meeting of 29 July 2021, a <u>report</u> (Item 10) was tabled on the work currently being undertaken by Kainga Ora and Council staff to establish a Fairfield-Enderley Urban Development Partnership. The partnership, which consists of iwi and mana whenua, community, local and central government, and other stakeholders, is developing a programme that aims to achieve outcomes that meet the aspirations of the community.
- 35. The report noted the links between this initiative and the area plan work being undertaken through the District Plan Change Programme.
- 36. Updates on the initiative will be reported to the District Plan Committee through the General Manager's report.

# **Emerging issues**

- 37. As work progresses and investigations get underway, issues are emerging that sit outside the current scope of the programme of work and may need to be considered.
- 38. Two such issues, which will be discussed at the workshop following this meeting, are:
  - i. Flood mapping;
  - ii. Infrastructure funding and phasing.

#### Schedule

39. Overall, the programme is running slightly behind schedule due to Covid 19 lockdown restrictions preventing face-to-face stakeholder engagement and site visits to inspect buildings and trees.

# Infrastructure implications

- 40. The NPS-UD requires Council to change its District Plan to enable specific urban outcomes, including increasing residential density across the city and identifying new areas for greater urban regeneration at a scale and extent materially different to the current District Plan settings.
- 41. As previously noted in updates to the District Plan Committee, it is becoming clear that these changes will require a very significant step change in the provision of infrastructure beyond what is anticipated in the 2021-31 Long Term Plan and the 2021-2051 Infrastructure Strategy if the development rights created by the changes are taken up.
- 42. Investigations for the selected localities and area plans are currently underway.
- 43. While it may take decades for any change in development rights to manifest in significant changes to the built environment, the NPS-UD specifically requires that decisions on urban development that affect urban environments are (amongst others) *integrated with infrastructure planning and funding decisions.*
- 44. Therefore, it is critical to think now about prioritising infrastructure spend in certain infill areas and to also consider how future investment needs to be phased over time. This will be the focus of a workshop directly after this meeting.

#### Risks - Tuuraru

45. Risks are currently tracked at project and programme level and the programme utilises the councils risk management framework to manage risks. Key programme risks are outlined below.

# Financial Considerations - Whaiwhakaaro Puutea

- 46. The District Plan Programme is funded through the 2021-31 Long Term Plan. The overall budget for the 10-year period is \$13 million. The budget for the current financial year is \$3.28M.
- 47. There will be a quarterly financial update in the General Manager's report, the first one being in November 2021. The update will show actual spend to date versus budget to date. We will also include any forecast adjustments that the team have made where relevant.

# Legal and Policy Considerations - Whaiwhakaaro-aa-ture

48. Staff confirm that this matter complies with the Council's legal and policy requirements.

# Wellbeing Considerations - Whaiwhakaaro-aa-oranga tonutanga

- 49. The purpose of Local Government changed on the 14 May 2019 to include promotion of the social, economic, environmental and cultural wellbeing of communities in the present and for the future ('the 4 wellbeings').
- 50. The subject matter of this report has been evaluated in terms of the 4 wellbeings during the process of developing this report.
- 51. The recommendations set out in this report are consistent with that purpose.
- 52. There are no known social, economic, environmental or cultural considerations associated with this matter.
