1. Apologies – Tono aroha

Resolved: (Cr Ewan/Cr Pascoe)

That the apologies for absence from Cr Forsyth are accepted.

2. Confirmation of Agenda – Whakatau raarangi take

Resolved: (Cr Ewan/Cr Maxine)

That the agenda is confirmed noting that item 7 (Objection to disqualification from dog ownership - Ropata Marshall) was deferred to a future meeting of the panel to take place on the 1st September 2020.

3. Declarations of Interest – Tauaakii whaipaanga

No members of the Panel declared a Conflict of Interest.

Item 5 (Objection to dangerous classification - Yalda Ahmadi) was taken after item 3 (Declarations of Interest – Tauaakii whaipaanga) to accommodate members of the public.

5. Objection to dangerous classification - Yalda Ahmadi

Ms Ahmadi spoke in objection of the dangerous classification and responded to questions from Members concerning the circumstances of the incident including how the property was fenced, the location and size of a 'Beware of Dog' sign, previous behaviour of the dog, current arrangements for housing the dog and what precautions were in place to prevent future incidents. Ms Ahmadi confirmed she was not present at the time of the incident.

The Animal Control Team Leader then outlined the report and provided a verbal update. He

responded to questions from Members including concerning apparent discrepancies between accounts of the incident, whether the property was fenced, previous behavioural issues, legislative requirements for fencing and property access regarding dangerous dogs, and staff understanding regarding current arrangements for housing the dog. Staff confirmed that when a dangerous dog is classified as such, the owner has 30 days to comply with the notice.

Report Status	Open
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Purpose - Take

1. To seek a determination from the Dog Control Hearings Panel on the disqualification from dog ownership of Ropata Marshall.

Staff Recommendation - Tuutohu-aa-kaimahi

- 2. That the Dog Control Hearings Panel:
 - a) receives the report; and
 - b) determines that the disqualification from dog ownership of Ropata Marshall is upheld.

Executive Summary - Whakaraapopototanga matua

- 3. Section 25 of the Dog Control Act 1996 notes that a territorial authority must disqualify a person from being a dog owner if they have received three infringements in a 24-month period or committed an offence under the following acts:
 - The Dog Control Act 1996
 - Part 1 or Part 2 of the Animal Welfare Act 1999
 - Section 26ZZP of the Conservation Act 1987 or
 - Section 56I of the National Parks Act 1980.
- 4. Ropata Marshall has received five infringements for three separate events in a 24-month period.
- 5. Staff recommend that the Dog Control Hearings Panel uphold the disqualification for the recommended period, as detailed in the options section below.
- 6. Staff have considered the key considerations under the Significance and Engagement Policy and have assessed that the matter in this report has a low level of significance.

Background - Kooreo whaimaarama

7. Ropata Marshall was disqualified from dog ownership on 17 February 2020 (Attachment 1) and his written objection was received on 23 March 2020 (Attachment 2). After a dog owner has received three infringements within a 24-month period the Council must disqualify them from dog ownership (see Legal and Policy section, paragraphs 24-27).

- 8. Ropata Marshall has received five infringements for three separate incidents involving two dogs (Batman and Blue) over a three-month period, from January to March 2020. Ropata Marshall is the owner of Batman and was the owner of Blue up until 12 February 2020, when he re-homed her.
- 9. Batman is a male, Pit Bull Terrier type-dog approximately one year old. Blue was a female, Pit Bull Terrier-type dog. Batman and Blue were litter mates.
- 10. The three incidents that resulted in infringements are:
 - 29/1/2020

Blue out roaming, able to get off the property by jumping the boundary fence. When AECOs arrived, Blue jumped the fence and rushed at the officers. Infringement #12664 issued for failure to keep dog controlled or confined (s52a).

10/2/2020

Dog attack, Blue and Batman "bailed up" a member of the public and when another man went to assist them the dogs turned on him. Infringements #12709 and #12710 issued for failure to keep dog under control (s53).

• 7/3/2020

Batman and Blue were out roaming and entered the complainant's house rushing at his children. Infringements #12673 and #12674 issued for failure to keep dog controlled or confined (s52a) and failure to comply with any bylaw authorised by this section (s20) respectively). (Full animal histories – **Attachment 3** and copy of infringements (Attachment 4)

Note: Blue was owned by Ropata Marshall and resided at Lilac St when the first two offences occurred. Blue's ownership was transferred to a W. Marsters on 12/2/2020. For the third offence Ropata Marshall was infringed for both dogs because at the time Blue was staying at his address in Lilac St and he was the person in charge of the dog at the time of the incident (infringement #12674)

- 11. Blue and Batman were subsequently impounded for another incident that occurred on 20 March 2020. Blue's new owner did not claim her, and Blue was euthanised on 28 May 2020.
- 12. Ropata Marshall is objecting to being disqualified from dog ownership on the following ground:
 - Blue, not Batman, is the instigator of incidents.
 - The applicant has been co-operative with Animal Control staff.
 - The applicant has taken steps to mitigate the behaviour of Batmaan including, fixing fencing, supervising him in the garden and is willing to undertake any training directed by AEC. (See **Attachment 5** for full objection submissions from James Carter, Solicitor).
- 13. Ropata Marshall will be accompanied by his solicitor, James Carter, during the hearing on 1 September 2020.

Discussion - Matapaki

- 14. In considering their decision, panel members should consider:
 - the number of incidents that have occurred
 - the nature and seriousness of those incidents
 - any escalation in behaviour demonstrated by the dog
 - what steps the dog owner has taken to prevent further occurrences and the timeliness of those actions
 - the potential impact to public safety.

- 15. Roaming dogs across Hamilton city are an issue which has been highlighted recently. Dogs that roam frequently expand their "territory" and can show signs of aggression towards people or animals that enter it, posing a risk to public safety.
- 16. Disqualification from dog ownership is based on the past behaviour of the dog(s) that resulted in three or more infringements in a 24-month period. It is not founded on what the future behaviour of the dog may be.
- 17. While Batman is noted by the owner and Mr Carter as not being the instigator of the incidents that occurred, this does not excuse or justify the behaviour of Batman and the impacts it had on community members.
- 18. Ropata Marshall has at all times been courteous with AEC staff. However, if he had taken the actions that he has since the last incident on 20 March 2020 and been disqualified from dog ownership back in October 2019, we wouldn't be where we are today, and two families and two other members of the public would not have been subjected to terror. In October 2019 when AEC first became aware of the puppies and the poor behaviour they displayed, Ropata Marshall met with AEC staff and was given advice on re-homing and managing the puppies' behaviour.
- 19. Mr Carter notes that an infringement for s53 (failing to control) of the Dog Control Act 1996 requires an offence greater than that of "mere roaming" and in this he is correct. The behaviours beyond roaming that Batman and Blue displayed which resulted in the infringements (#12709 and #12710) include rushing at Animal Control staff, "bailing up" a member of the public and turning on his would-be rescuer.

Options - Kōwhiringa

- 20. Under the Dog Control Act 1996, territorial authorities have four potential outcomes/options in determining an objection to disqualification. They are:
 - I. uphold the disqualification for the recommended period
 - II. uphold the disqualification but bring the termination date forward
 - III. terminate the disqualification immediately
 - IV. change the disqualification to that of probationary owner.
- 21. Staff recommend option one because of the extensive history of unacceptable behaviour in the dogs that Ropata Marshall owned or was in charge of at the time the incidents occurred.
- 22. Ropata Marshall has not demonstrated responsible dog ownership in that little action appears to have been taken to prevent Batman and Blue from roaming from when they first came to the notice of AEC and the last event in March 2020.

Financial Considerations

23. This is a regular operating activity funded through the 2018-2028 Long Term Plan.

Legal and Policy Considerations

- 24. Section 25 of the Dog Control Act 1996 notes that a territorial authority must disqualify a person from being a dog owner if they have received three infringements in a 24-month period or committed an offence under the following acts:
 - The Dog Control Act 1996
 - Part 1 or Part 2 of the Animal Welfare Act 1999
 - Section 26ZZP of the Conservation Act 1987 or
 - Section 56I of the National Parks Act 1980.

- 25. <u>Section 26</u> of the Dog Control Act 1996 sets a person's right to object to disqualification from dog ownership and the territorial authorities' responsibilities in considering that objection.
- 26. If a dog owner is dissatisfied with the outcome from the territorial authority's hearing process under <u>section 27</u> of the Dog Control Act, they may appeal to the District Court.
- 27. Staff confirm that the disqualification and options provided for the Dog Control Hearings Panel comply with Council's legal obligations under the Dog Control Act 1996.

Wellbeing Considerations - Whaiwhakaaro-aa-oranga tonutanga

- 28. The purpose of Local Government changed on the 14 May 2019 to include promotion of the social, economic, environmental and cultural wellbeing of communities in the present and for the future ('the 4 wellbeings').
- 29. The subject matter of this report has been evaluated in terms of the 4 wellbeings during the process of developing this report.
- 30. The recommendations set out in this report are consistent with that purpose.

Social

31. Staff considers that the keeping of animals can enhance the quality of life and well-being for individuals and families; however, staff also have a responsibility to protect the community from unreasonable animal nuisances – families, whanau, iwi, haapu, and communities should be safe from dangerous animals.

Risks - Tuuraru

32. Should the disqualification be overturned AEC, believe Batman could potentially pose an ongoing risk of roaming if stringent containment measures are not adhered to.

Significance & Engagement Policy - Kaupapa here whakahira/anganui

- 33. Staff have considered the key considerations under the Significance and Engagement Policy and have assessed that the matter(s) in this report has/have a low level of significance.
- 34. Given the low level of significance determined, the engagement level is low. No engagement is required.

EFFECT OF DISQUALIFICATION Section 28, Dog Control Act 1996

You are required to dispose of every dog owned by you within 14 days of the date of this notice.

However, you may not dispose of a dog-

- to a person who resides at the same address as you; or
- in a way that constitutes an offence against the Dog Control Act 1996 or any other Act.

You must not become the owner, even on a temporary basis, of any dog while you are disqualified. You may have possession of a dog only for the purpose of-

- preventing it from causing injury, damage, or distress; or
- returning, within 72 hours, a lost dog to a territorial authority for the purpose of restoring the dog to its owner.

You will commit an offence and be liable on conviction to a fine not exceeding \$3,000 if you-

- fail to dispose of every dog owned by you within 14 days of this notice; or
- at any time while disqualified, become the owner of any dog; or
- · dispose of a dog owned by you-
- to a person who resides at the same address as you; or
- in a manner that constitutes an offence against the Dog Control Act 1996 or any other Act.

If you are convicted of the first or second of these offences, your period of disqualification may be further extended.

You will also commit an offence and be liable on conviction to a fine not exceeding \$3,000 if you dispose or give custody or possession of a dog to a person knowing that person to be disqualified from ownership under section 25 of the Dog Control Act 1996.

Full details of the effect of disqualification are provided in the Dog Control Act 1996.

RIGHT OF OBJECTION TO DISQUALIFICATION Section 26, Dog Control Act

You may object to the disqualification by lodging a written objection with the Hamilton City Council setting out the grounds on which you object. You are entitled to be heard in support of your objection and will be notified of the time and place when your objection will be heard. No objection can be lodged within 12 months of the hearing of any previous objection to the disqualification. If an objection is lodged within 14 days after the date of this notice, the requirement to dispose of every dog owned by you will be suspended until the Hamilton City Council has determined the objection.

There is a further right of appeal to the District Court if you are dissatisfied with the decision of the Hamilton City Council on your objection.

Good afternoon Peter

If you intending to file a prosecution then the disposal of the dog falls with the court remit upon conviction. The s. 71 Notice only becomes relevant if there is an application for the release of the dog, what about the dog owner who is going to be prosecuted but accepts that the dog will not be released and does make such an application? S. 72 (2) is engaged in the absence of no release application.

As the decision as to prosecution is still effectively pending it would not, in my opinion, for the council to rely upon s. 69 would be erroneous.

In addition, I note your comments regarding wishing to fight for his dog and pay fees, etc. However, s. 71(4) clearly does not place any time limit on making an application for release, this, in turn, aids in the interpretation that when a prosecution is to take place then the right to dispose of a dog as per s. 69 DCA does not apply.

Disqualification:

My client has been disqualified for a period of 5 years by Notice dated 18 March 2020. In accordance with s. 26 DCA please take this email as Notice of objection under s. 26 (1) (a) & (b).

I note this requires a hearing and this may well take some time for the matter to be arranged [especially due to the current health climate].

It may be possible to arrange a hearing via AVL but that remains a matter for discussion. There is also an option for the matter to be heard on the papers, however, that would require the agreement of the dog owner taking into account s. 26(1)(b) which grants the applicant the entitlement to be "heard".

Please confirm you will not be taking any action to dispose of Batman taking into account the above submissions.

MAY IT PLEASE THE HEARINGS COMMITTEE:

- Mr Ropata Marshall [the Applicant] is the registered owner of a male black and white Pitbull cross breed named "Batman".
- The Applicant, by notice, dated the 18th March 2020, was disqualified from owning a dog for the maximum period of five [5] years on the basis of being issued three [3] or more infringement notices within a 24 month period.¹
- 3. Copies of the Correspondence included with the Infringement Notices is attached and Annexed "A". The Committee is referred to Notice No. 12664 [page 3 of 3] that refers to a dog named "Blue". It should be noted the Applicant was looking after this dog for a third party. What is clear is that the Applicant's own dog [Batman] behaved poorly when with this other dog. The dog "Blue" does not reside with the Applicant and does not visit.² The Committee is invited to give this notice less weight than Notices No.'s 12617, 12709 and 12710 which involve Batman.
- 4. By notice, dated the 23rd March 2020, an objection was filed within the required timeframe. The dog "Batman" was subsequently returned to the care of the Applicant and currently remains in his care.

The Law:

- 5. The ability to disqualify a dog owner from ownership falls within the discretion of a Territorial Authority [TA]. It is not a power that may be exercised by the District Court [although there is an avenue of appeal against the decision of the Hearings Committee via s. 27 Dog Control Act 1996 [DCA]].
- 6. In this case the power to disqualify has been exercised within s. 25 (1) (a) of the DCA. S. 25 (1) is subject to s. 25 (1A) that permits the TA not to disqualify if the TA is satisfied that the circumstance of the offence or offences are such that disqualification is not warranted [s.

¹ S. 25 (1) (a) Dog Control Act 1996. The maximum period of disqualification is five [5] years and the legislation is drafted to permit the TA to apply the period depending upon the severity of the offence. A TA should be able to justify the period imposed especially when the maximum is applied.

² It is not known if Blue remains with the Hamilton City Council.

- 25 (1A) (a)] or that the TA will instead classify the dog owner as a probationary owner [s. 25 (1A) (b)].³
- 7. Therefore, despite the wording of s. 25 (1) that states a TA "must" disqualify, a TA may fall back upon s. 25 (1A) and not disqualify the dog owner. The alternative should the TA conclude some form of control is required to monitor the dog owner is to utilise s. 25 (1A) (b) and classify the dog owner as a probationary owner.
- 8. S. 21 (2) DCA [Classification of probationary owners] reflects s. 26 (1) (a) in that the TA may classify the dog owner as a probationary owner following three [3] or more infringement notices within a 24 month period.
- 9. Probationary owner status can last up to two [2] years and permits the TA to require the dog owner to undertake training [s. 23A].

Submissions:

- 10. A meeting was held with between Peter Crocker at the Animal Control Centre at Ellis Street, Hamilton and counsel for the Applicant. During the discussion Mr Crocker stated that the dog, Batman, when by himself is a nice dog. However, when he was with Blue then Batman's behaviour is poor. Blue is the instigator. The Applicant accepted this and since Batman was seized [along with Blue] and subsequently released there has been no contact between the dogs and will not be in the future.⁴
- 11. The Applicant has always been cooperative with Animal Control staff and has demonstrated a willingness to work with staff in the future. This cooperative manner is essential should the Committee decide to classify the Applicant as a probationary owner. It will permit staff to monitor the dog as well as give ongoing advice should the need arise.
- 12. The infringement notices are for failing to control, an infringement offence contrary to s. 53 DCA [Offence of failing to keep dog under control] captures a wide range of behaviour above that of mere roaming in a public place. S. 53 therefore requires further adverse

³ It is submitted this power is also delegated to council staff so that the decision either not to disqualify or classify as a probationary owner is available to staff in the first instance. Discussion between staff did take place and the decision was to refer this matter to Committee due to the number of infringements.

⁴ It is not known if Blue remains in custody as he is not owned by the Applicant who was looking after the dog on behalf of another person.

- behaviour by the dog. The Applicant accepts that the issue of the infringement notices was not without just cause.
- 13. In response, the Applicant submits that since the dog Blue has been taken out of the picture the behaviour of Batman had radically altered and he does not make any attempt to leave the property. Batman is kept inside the dwelling and is not permitted to run freely on the property unsupervised.
- 14. The Applicant is aware that Batman has, by his previous actions, displayed adverse learnt behaviour. Since Batman's release from Council custody he has been kept inside the house and under supervision in the garden, it is submitted the previous learnt behaviour has been minimised or indeed removed since Batman's release.
- 15. In summary, the offences involved Batman getting over the boundary fence and then running across other properties. It is accepted this would have caused alarm to those persons occupying the boundary property. It is salient that when this took place Batman was in the company of Blue. As stated, this situation can no longer occur.
- 16. The Applicant has demonstrated an ability to accept responsibility for his previous poor dog ownership. With regards to looking after Blue the Applicant was attempting to assist a friend however it become noticeably clear this assistance came at the cost of Batman's behaviour and subsequent seizure. In short, the Applicant accepts his assistance to his friend was misplaced.
- 17. The Applicant has taken several steps to make sure Batman is kept under control.
 - Batman is no longer permitted to be in the garden unsupervised.
 - Batman is not permitted to be in the company of Blue.
 - The front of the property is fully fenced with a metal gate.
 - The remaining boundary is fully fenced.
 - The area that Batman was able to get through has been strengthened and the fence has been heightened [see photograph at Schedule 1 page 6].
 - The Applicant consistently demonstrates cooperation with Council staff, listens to and accepts advice.
 - The Applicant is willing to undertake any training that the Council requires.

- The Applicant is willing to grant consent to council staff to enter the property at a reasonable time, and without statutory power, to monitor Batman.
- 18. Batman is a family dog and lives with the Applicant, his partner and two children. The dog interacts very well with the children. That said the Applicant is aware of the risk of any dog and takes appropriate steps should a stranger come to the property.
- 19. Dogs are an integrated part of New Zealand society not only as pets but working animals. The loss of dog from a family causes distress under normal circumstances [for example death]. However, the loss of a dog through the powers of legislation makes it difficult for family members to accept, especially children. The Applicant accepts that his negligence, with regards to historic dog ownership, has put the loss of Batman at risk. In addition, the other dog of the family will also be required to be removed should the disqualification be upheld.
- 20. It is established law that no person may own a dog on a property where a person resides who is disqualified.
- 21. It is agreed that Council staff have acted correctly by referring this matter to the Hearings Committee rather than exercise their delegated authority to either remove the disqualification or classify the Applicant as a probationary owner.
- 22. It is submitted that the Hearings Committee may take comfort in all the efforts the Applicant has made to make sure no further incidents take place. Indeed, since Batman was released no further incidents have taken place.
- 23. The good attitude of the Applicant towards council staff can reassure the Committee that any required training will be undertaken as well as any general advice followed should he be classified as a probationary owner. As stated, the Applicant is more than willing for Council staff to undertake spot checks and grants access to his property for this purpose, even where a statutory power to enter does not exist.
- 24. The Hearings Committee may make the following decisions:
 - Confirm the disqualification.

- Confirm the disqualification but reduce the time period.⁵
- Remove the disqualification and impose the classification of probationary owner.
- Remove the disqualification and not classify the Applicant as a probationary owner.
- 25. It is accepted the option to remove the disqualification and not to classify as a probationary owner is unrealistic. It cannot be argued that such a decision would address the requirement for public safety.
- 26. It is submitted that removing the disqualification and classifying the Applicant as a probationary owner would address the requirement for public safety. This submission is further supported as a condition that access to the property be granted at any reasonable time [without a statutory power to enter] would be agreed.
- 27. The Applicant is also fully aware that any further incident will likely result in a prosecution, and even if the offence does not carry destruction, that disqualification [upon conviction] will be the result.
- 28. The Hearings Committee is invited to remove the disqualification and classify the Applicant as a probationary owner in accordance with s. 21 DCA 1996.

Report Status	Open
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Purpose - Take

1. To seek a determination from the Dog Control Hearings Panel on the classification of "Rocky Reeda" as a menacing dog.

Staff Recommendation - Tuutohu-aa-kaimahi

- 2. That the Dog Control Hearings Panel:
 - a) receives the report; and
 - b) determines that the classification of Rocky Reeda as a menacing dog is upheld.

Executive Summary - Whakaraapopototanga matua

- 3. Rocky Reeda is a medium-sized Fox Terrier/Maltese cross dog that was classified as menacing as the result of an attack on a 12-year old boy out scootering with his family.
- 4. Section 33A of the Dog Control Act 1996 sets out the circumstances in which a territorial authority may classify a dog as menacing and section 33B outlines a dog owner's right to object to that classification (as detailed in paragraphs 23-25 of this report).
- 5. Staff recommend that the classification of Rocky Reeda as a menacing dog is upheld (Option A) as detailed in paragraph 21 below.
- 6. Staff consider the decision in this report has low significance and that the recommendations comply with the Council's legal requirements.

Background - Kooreo whaimaarama

- 7. Rocky Reeda is a medium-sized, approximately five-year-old, male Fox Terrier/Maltese cross dog.
- 8. On 10 May 2020, at approximately 1600 hours (4pm) the victim, a 12-year-old boy, was out walking and scootering with his family. He was about 50 metres ahead of his parents when he moved onto the road to pass another group of walkers.
- 9. At this point, Rocky Reeda ran towards the victim, dragging the seven-year-old child walking him onto the road. The child's mother yelled something, and he let the leash go. Rocky Reeda continued across the road and began barking at the victim.

- 10. The victim leaned down to pick up the loose dog's lead; the dog then jumped up and bit him on the left side of his chest near the nipple. He gave the dog's lead to the male dog owner and went back to his parents.
- 11. The victim showed his mother a bite mark on his chest. A heated exchange then occurred between the victim's parents and the female dog owner; for full details including photographs and witness statements from both parties see CRM196092 (Attachment 1).
- 12. As a result of this attack, Rocky Reeda was classified as menacing for behaviour (see **Attachment 2** menacing classification).
- 13. On 14 July 2020 an objection to the classification of the dog Rocky Reeda as menacing was received from Taryn Van Meygaarden, the registered dog owner (**Attachment 3**).

Discussion - Matapaki

- 14. In considering their decision, panel members should consider:
 - the incident that formed the basis for the classification
 - the number and type of incidents that have occurred
 - any escalation in behaviour demonstrated by the dog
 - the potential impact to public safety.
- 15. Dogs can behave in unexpected ways and it would appear that in this case, Rocky Reeda's behaviour towards the boy on the scooter is somewhat surprising to the dog owner. The victim's mother noted in her witness statement that the dog owner allegedly told her that the dog had issues with children on scooters, so while Rocky Reeda biting a child may have been a surprise, there is a noted predisposition to issues with scooters for this dog.
- 16. Rocky Reeda displayed a level of determination to reach the child on the scooter. He dragged the child walking him along, causing him to fall and be injured before he let go of the lead. If it was the scooter that triggered this behaviour, that is a cause for concern as when out walking or off lead in an off-lead park, there is a good chance Rocky Reeda will encounter scooter users again, so there is a potential ongoing risk to members of the public.
- 17. It is good to see the dog owners taking pro-active actions, employing a dog trainer and utilising a muzzle, to minimise an event like this occurring again. The most effective way to ensure that another child out scootering isn't bitten is to ensure Rocky Reeda is muzzled whenever he is out in public. The only way we can ensure this happens is by upholding the menacing classification, as muzzling is a requirement under the Dog Control Act 1996 for menacing classified dogs.
- 18. Lockdown generally seemed to have positive benefits for dogs as owners were home more often, so dogs received more attention/family interaction. Animal Control anecdotally noted more dogs out being walked/exercised than usual during this period.
- 19. The dog owner is objecting to the classification of menacing on the following grounds:
 - the incident was out of character
 - a muzzle has been purchased, even though they do not believe he is menacing
 - he has not shown aggression to visitors to the home
 - they are working with a dog trainer to ensure nothing like this happens again
 - they believe lockdown adversely affected Rocky Reeda
 - Rocky Reeda is a gentle dog.

(Full details are in **Attachment 3** – objection received).

Options

- 20. Under the Dog Control Act 1996, territorial authorities have two options when considering an outcome of an objection to a dog being classified as menacing:
 - A. To uphold the classification, or
 - B. To overturn the classification.
- 21. Staff recommend **Option A** because the best way to minimise the risk to other scooter riders, particularly children, is for Rocky Reeda to be muzzled when out in public and this can only be enforced under the Dog Control Act 1996 menacing or dangerous classifications.

Financial Considerations - Whaiwhakaaro Puutea

22. This is a regular operating activity funded through the Long-Term Plan.

Legal and Policy Considerations - Whaiwhakaaro-aa-ture

- 23. <u>Section 33A</u> of the Dog Control Act 1996 sets out the circumstances in which a territorial authority may classify a dog as dangerous including:
 - The owner has been convicted of owning a dog that has attacked
 - On the basis of sworn evidence attesting to aggressive behaviour by the dog
 - The owner of the dog admits in writing that the dog is dangerous.
- 24. <u>Section 33B</u> outlines a dog owner's right to object to the classification to the territorial authority and the territorial authority's obligations and considerations in respect to hearing the objection.
- 25. Staff confirm that the classification of menacing and options provided for the Dog Control Hearings Panel comply with the Council's legal requirements under the Dog Control Act 1996.

Wellbeing Considerations - Whaiwhakaaro-aa-oranga tonutanga

- 26. The purpose of Local Government changed on the 14 May 2019 to include promotion of the social, economic, environmental and cultural wellbeing of communities in the present and for the future ('the 4 wellbeings').
- 27. The subject matter of this report has been evaluated in terms of the 4 wellbeings during the process of developing this report as outlined below.
- 28. Staff consider that the keeping of animals can enhance the quality of life and wellbeing for individuals and families; however, the Council also has a responsibility to protect the community from unreasonable animal nuisances families, whanau, iwi, haapu, and communities should be safe from dangerous animals.

Risks - Tuuraru

29. Should the menacing classification be overturned, removing the owner's obligations to muzzle the dog in public, AEC staff believe Rocky Reeda could pose an ongoing risk given his noted aversion to scooters.

Significance & Engagement Policy - *Kaupapa here whakahira/anganui* Significance

30. Staff have considered the key considerations under the Significance and Engagement Policy and have assessed that the recommendation(s) in this report has/have a low level of significance.

Statement from Glenda from Amberley Place, Hamilton. The statement has been taken over the phone due to the country being in Level 3.

On the 10/5/20 at approximately 4pm I was walking along Magellan Rise with my husband, our three children and our dog Roxy.

My two sons were around 50m in front of us on scooters. My 12-year-old son Miles then went out onto the road on his scooter to pass the people in front of him, as I have been teaching my children to keep their distance when passing others due to the lockdown.

I then heard a woman screaming and looked up to see a boy on the opposite side of the road to us being dragged along the pavement on his stomach and then onto the road by a dog on a lead.

The woman shouted something at the boy and he let go of the lead.

The dog has then run over to my sons on their scooters and started barking at Miles.

The dog was medium sized, a terrier cross, long hair, dark blonde and lighter underneath (similar to a golden retriever) and was wearing a collar and lead, I'm unsure what the sex of the dog was.

Miles has the leaned down to pick up the lead and as he has stood up the dog has jumped up at him and bitten him near his left nipple.

The male dog owner has then come over and taken the lead off Miles and re-joined his family and continued their walk. (3 adults, 2 children and 3 dogs)

Miles scootered back to me and looked upset. I asked him what was wrong, and he said the dog had bitten him. He lifted his top to show the bite mark.

I yelled over to the dog owners that their dog had bitten my son.

The female dog owner then responded defensively, was swearing and called us liars. The male dog owner claimed he saw the whole thing and said the dog just jumped up and didn't bite, and then said if he made contact it would have just been a scratch.

The female dog owners mother came over to us and asked if Miles was ok, I replied no because he's been bitten by their dog. We then showed her the bite.

She then called over to her daughter and said she needs to come over and have a look.

The female dog owner then came over and didn't look at the bite but instead had a go at my husband saying the kids shouldn't be on the road on their scooters without helmets.

She then went on to say her dog has issues with scooters as kids come past their house and tease him on them. I then said if you know your dog has issues then it should be muzzled out in public.

The female dog owner then lost her cool and said she was a Vet at Care Vets Rototuna and she knows about dog behaviour, and that I don't. And then continued to rant and rave.

My husband then told her if she doesn't want to take responsibility for her dog and what it's done then we will report it. She replied go ahead.

We said we'll take a photo of your dog too, she said that's fine, but as the dog was back with the family we could only get a photo of the back of the dog.

I asked for the dog's registration number as well but because she was still ranting at my husband I don't know if she heard me.

The female dog owners mother kept trying to calm her down, and whilst we were all talking their dog was barking at our dog Roxy.

We then told them we weren't getting anywhere and that we were leaving.

Miles has not received medical treatment for his injury but the bite has left a mark on him and looks worse a day later. Photos have been sent to Animal Control.

Witnesses- There was a lady who came out of her house but didn't see the bite, she just witnessed the arguing after the bite.

Statement from Benjamin From Santiago Place, Hamilton. The statement has been taken over the phone due to the country being in Level 3.

On the 10/5/20 at approximately 4pm I was walking out of Santiago Place, turning right onto Magellan Rise with my wife Taryn, our two sons Adam and Luke, my wife's mother Doreen, her dog Toby and our two dogs' Rocky and Layla. I was about 5m behind the rest of my family.

Taryn was holding Layla, our bigger dog's lead, Doreen was holding onto her dog Toby and my son Luke had hold of our other dog Rocky.

I noticed a boy on a scooter pulling a wheelie and remember thinking that was cool. I could see a younger boy behind him also on a scooter.

I could see the older boy slowed down on his scooter and was looking across at my family. I then heard Taryn calling to Luke, I looked and could see Rocky dragging Luke (7 years old) towards the road, Luke was stumbling and started to fall, so Taryn shouted to him to let go of the lead.

Luke let go of the lead and fell and hurt himself on the curb.

Rocky ran over to the older boy who was now stopped on the road with his scooter. Rocky ran around the older boy and was barking. He then stopped and was on our side of the boy.

Taryn went to see to Luke, so I went to get Rocky as I was worried he was going to run off. The older boy leaned down, picked up the lead and then stood back up.

Rocky then lunged at him. I was just 2m away and it didn't look like Rocky made any contact with him.

The older boy still had a hold of the lead, I thanked him as I took the lead and asked him if he was OK. He replied Yes.

I took Rocky back to our side of the road and checked if Luke was OK. Then there was shouting, and I noticed there was a family with the two boys, who had been walking a bit behind them.

The older boy had his shirt up and was showing something to the female. I could see a mark on him and then asked Taryn if she thinks he got that from Rocky. Taryn said we should check.

Taryn went over to talk to the family, and it got a bit heated, with the family accusing Rocky of biting their son. Their dog was barking at Rocky, so he was barking back.





Classification of Dog as Menacing Dog Section 33A Dog Control Act 1996

Section 33A of the Dog Control Act 1996 ("DCA") enables Hamilton City Council ("HCC"), to classify a dog that it considers poses a threat to any person, stock, poultry, domestic animal, or protected wildlife because of:

- a. any observed or reported behaviour of the dog; or
- b. any characteristics typically associated with the dog's breed or type.

As a result of the observed or reported behaviour HCC has classified the dog as a Menacing Dog under s33A of the Dog Control Act 1996. The Notice of Classification of Dog as Menacing Dog ("the Notice") is enclosed.

HCC requires you to have the dog de-sexed, and to provide a copy of the de-sexing certificate to HCC within one month from the date shown on the Notice.

You may be able to take advantage of discounts available through HCC for de-sexing fees with a contracted veterinarian. Microchipping is also available at the Animal Education and Control Centre. If you would like further information about these services, please contact the Animal Education and Control team on 838 6632.

Please ensure that you comply with the requirements of the classification within the timeframes outlined in the enclosed Notice to avoid any further enforcement action. If you do not agree with the Classification you may object in writing within 14 days of receiving the Classification. You must have valid ground for an objection and produce evidence that your dog is not of a breed or type listed above.

(c) must, if a certificate under paragraph (b)(ii) is produced to HCC, produce to HCC, within 1 month after the date specified in that certificate, a further certificate under paragraph (b)(i).

You will commit an offence and be liable on conviction to a fine not exceeding \$3,000 if you fail to comply with all of the matters in paragraphs (a) to (c) above.

A dog control officer or dog ranger may seize and remove the dog from you if you fail to comply with all of the matters in paragraphs (a) to (c) above. The officer or ranger may keep the dog until you demonstrate that you are willing to comply with paragraphs (a) to (c).

You are also required, for the purposes of providing permanent identification of the dog, to arrange for the dog to be implanted with a functioning microchip transponder. This must be confirmed by making the dog available to HCC in accordance with the reasonable instructions of HCC for verification that the dog has been implanted with a functioning microchip transponder of the prescribed type and in the prescribed location.

You will commit an offence and be liable on conviction to a fine not exceeding \$3,000 if you fail to comply with this requirement within 2 months after the dog is classified as menacing.

If the dog is in the possession of another person (for a period not exceeding 72 hours), you must advise that person of the requirement to not allow the dog to be at large or in any public place or in any private way (other than when confined completely within a vehicle or cage) without the dog being muzzled in such a manner as to prevent the dog from biting but to allow it to breathe and drink without obstruction. You will commit an offence and be liable on summary conviction to a fine not exceeding \$500 if you fail to comply with this requirement.

Full details of the effect of the classification of a dog as menacing are provided in the Dog Control Act 1996. This is available to view online at www.legislation.govt.nz.

You may object to the classification of your dog as menacing by lodging with HCC a written objection within 14 days of receipt of this notice setting out the grounds on which you object.

Dear Susan,

Thank you for your notice dated 10 July 2020 advising me of the outcome of the complaint of my dog rushing a scooter on May 10, 2020.

I am writing to appeal the classification of my dog Rocky microchip number 953010000639787 as a menacing dog under section 33C of the Dog Control Act 1996.

Please find attached a copy of his desexing certificate. He was desexed at 7 months old by myself at Carevets Rototuna.

The following points are the grounds under which I object:

- 1. Rocky is a very obedient dog having been to 3 terms of dog obedience with Phoenix Dog Obedience as a younger dog and passing intermediate level. The incident on May 10 was very out of character for him. Unfortunately I was not the person holding his leash as I had control of our younger dog. I believe had I had Rocky the event would not have occurred. We were out on a rare family walk under Lockdown and the circumstances were not as they would usually have been under Level 1 or pre Lockdown.
- 2. Despite my belief Rocky is not menacing after talking with Justin Harden at the Hamilton City Council I went to work the very next day and purchased him a muzzle which he has worn on every walk since for the last 2 months. We have had no repeat of him attempting to rush at anyone or even bark since then.
- 3. We have had regular visiters including strangers to our home and Rocky has shown no signs of aggression or menacing to them. He is a barker so will bark if someone walks past our property but it is just that.
- 4. We have had Rocky assessed by, and are currently working with Darran Rowe of Mindfulness 4 Dogs with both our dogs to ensure the incident of May 10 will never happen again and have 2 happy and confident dogs at home and on walks. This work started within 2 weeks of the complaint being lodged. I am happy for you to contact Darran with regards to Rocky. I believe Lockdown adversely affected Rocky but now 6-7 weeks later he is his normal friendly self and we will continue to work closely with Darran and muzzle Rocky until he feels it is safe for him not to have a muzzle if the classification was removed.
- 5. The night of the incident I posted on social media so that the complainents knew who we were. I have never tried to hide the fact the incident occurred and have shown remorse over the words that were shared by both parties as emotions were high at the time with the incident involving children and pets.
- 6. The last is an emotional appeal on my behalf as Rocky's owner. My boy is a very gentle soul who loves his walks and people. He used to go off lead at Days Park prior to us getting a second dog 1.5 years ago. I honestly believe as his owner and a vet of 17 years that he does not deserve this classification based on 1 incident which was under the very unusual circumstances of Covid -19 Lockdown.

Thank you for your time in hearing out my objection.
