Purpose - Take

 To seek a determination from the Dog Control Hearings Panel on the classification of Cashew (the Dog) as a menacing dog.

Staff Recommendation - Tuutohu-aa-kaimahi

- 2. That the Dog Control Hearings Panel:
 - a) receives the report; and
 - b) confirms it has considered the mandatory matters specified under the Dog Control Act 1996, and other matters relevant to the objection; and
 - c) notes that the Dog Control Hearings Panel in determining any objection can only either uphold or rescind the classification under the Dog Control Act 1996; and
 - d) either **upholds** or **rescinds** the menacing classification.

Executive Summary - Whakaraapopototanga matua

- On 7 July 2025 Council received a complaint regarding Cashew (the Dog) being involved in a historic dog attack in Days Park, Hamilton on 11 June 2025 (refer to Attachment 1).
- 4. The Dog Control Act 1996 sets out the circumstances in which Council may classify a dog as menacing.
- 5. Staff recommend that the classification of the Dog as menacing is upheld.
- 6. Staff consider the decision in this report has low significance and that the recommendations comply with the Council's legal requirements.

Background - Koorero whaimaarama

7. On 7 July 2025 Council received a complaint regarding Cashew (the Dog) being involved in a historic dog attack in Days Park Hamilton on 11 June 2025 (refer to **Attachment 1**). The Dog is registered to Ms Malcolm (Owner).

- 8. The complaint primarily concerns the Dog attacking a smaller dog named Sooty (Dog B) while in Days Park. The Dog has picked Dog B up by the back of the neck then run away with him. The owners of Dog B and The Dog have managed to catch and separate the dogs. On examination Dog B was missing some patches of fur, while there was some blood there appeared to be no cuts or puncture wounds.
- 9. Prior to The Dog attacking Dog B the complainant/witness noticed The Dog had its hackles up and noted on this to the Dog Owner. Note: the complainant who reported the attack was a witness to the event and not the owner of Dog B.
- On 23 July 2025 the Dog was classified by staff as menacing. Refer to Attachment 2 for the Notice of Classification.
- 11. On 6 August 2025 an objection to the classification of the Dog as menacing was received from the Owners. Refer to **Attachment 3** for a copy of the objection.
- 12. As a result, a hearing has been convened to hear the objection. The Hearing Panel should note:
 - i. the Owners have advised that they wish to be heard in person; and
 - ii. Complainant has advised that they are unavailable to be heard in person.
- 13. The normal order of the procedure of a hearing is as follows:
 - i. opening of the meeting by the Chair;
 - ii. the Objector presents their objection and supporting evidence;
 - iii. any witnesses in support of the objection speak to their evidence;
 - iv. the Complainant and any witnesses in opposition of the objection speak to their evidence;
 - v. Staff summarise the Committee report and makes any comments regarding information provided at the hearing;
 - vi. the Objector has the opportunity to respond to any new matters or points not already covered during the hearing;
 - vii. the hearing is closed or adjourned for a decision to be made.
- 14. For the avoidance of doubt:
 - i. The Chair of the hearing may change the order of the hearing at their discretion.
 - ii. There is **no** opportunity for cross examination at the hearing by any party.
 - iii. Members of the Hearings Panel may ask questions for clarification of the parties during the hearing.

Discussion - Matapaki

- 15. <u>Section 33B</u> provides that in making its determination the Committee **must** have regard to:
 - i. the evidence which formed the basis for the classification;
 - ii. any steps taken by the owner to prevent any threat to the safety of persons or animals:
 - iii. the matters relied on in support of the objection; and
 - iv. any other relevant matters.

Evidence which formed the basis for the classification

- 16. In deciding to classify the Dog, staff have relied on the following evidence:
 - a. Statement from the complainant who is not the owner of The Dog or Dog B nut witnessed the entire event.

Matters relied on or advanced in support of the objection

- 17. The Owner objects to the classification on the following grounds:
 - a. To date no further information regarding grounds for objection have been received from the dog owner.
- 18. Refer to Attachment 3 for the copy of the objection.

Steps taken by the owner to prevent any threat to the safety of persons or animals

- 19. Staff are **not** aware of any further steps taken by the Owner to prevent any threat to the safety of persons or animals. The Owner may have further information on this matter at the hearing.
- 20. The dog is desexed.

Other relevant matters

- 21. The Dog Control Act 1996 requires consideration of any other matters that the Hearings Panel considers relevant.
- 22. Council's Dog Control Policy provides direction on how Council will fulfil its legislative responsibilities pursuant to the <u>Dog Control Act 1996</u> and the Dog Control Bylaw. The Hearing Panel should consider whether its decision is consistent with the purposes in the Dog Control Policy, specifically:
 - i. the need to minimise danger, distress, and nuisance to the community generally;
 - ii. the need to avoid the inherent danger in allowing dogs to have uncontrolled access to public places that are frequented by children, whether or not the children are accompanied by adults;
 - iii. the importance of enabling, to the extent that is practicable, the public (including families) to use streets and public amenities without fear of attack or intimidation by dogs;
 - iv. the exercise and recreational needs of dogs and their owners.
- Ownership history and recorded dog behaviour can be a relevant consideration if it provides evidence of prior good or poor dog or ownership behaviour.
- The Dog has been involved in a previous dog attack at Days Park in March 2024, however, the circumstances of this attack had two dogs both off leash just outside the park in an on-leash area and as both dog owners were some distance from their dogs it is not clear how the attack started. Both dogs received injuries in this attack. The Animal Education and Control Officer has closed this attack as advice given to both dog owners due to the uncertainty of how it started, both dogs being off leash in an area they shouldn't have been and both dogs received injuries (refer to Attachment 4).

Options

- 25. Under the <u>Dog Control Act 1996</u>, territorial authorities have two options when considering an outcome of an objection to a dog being classified as menacing:
 - i. to uphold the classification; or
 - ii. to rescind the classification.
- 26. There are no other options open to the Dog Control Hearings Panel under the <u>Dog Control Act</u> <u>1996</u>.
- 27. The staff recommendation is that the Hearings Panel uphold the classification for the following reasons:
 - i. The Dog was the aggressor during the incident on 11 June 2025.

- ii. The dog was displaying warning signs of aggression (hackles were up) prior to attacking Dog B, these were noticed and were noticed and commented on by the other dog owner and witness, however, these signs were ignored, and The Dog was not removed from the vicinity of the other dogs. The Dog, has then attacked Dog B
- iii. This is the second dog attack the Dog has been a part of.
- iv. One of the effects of a menacing classification is the requirement for the dog to be muzzled while in public place to prevent it from biting.

Financial Considerations - Whaiwhakaaro Puutea

28. This is a regular operating activity funded through the Long Term Plan.

Legal and Policy Considerations - Whaiwhakaaro-aa-ture

Menacing Dog Classification

- 26. Section 33A of the Dog Control Act 1996 provides that a territorial authority may classify dog as menacing that has not been classified as a dangerous dog under section 31; but a territorial authority considers may pose a threat to any person, stock, poultry, domestic animal, or protected wildlife because of
 - i. any observed or reported behaviour of the dog; or
 - ii. any characteristics typically associated with the dog's breed or type.

Effect of a menacing dog classification

- 27. If a dog is classified as a menacing dog under section 33A the owner of the dog:
 - must not allow the dog to be at large or in any public place or in any private way, except when confined completely within a vehicle or cage, without being muzzled in such a manner as to prevent the dog from biting but to allow it to breathe and drink without obstruction; and
 - ii. must, if required by the territorial authority (refer below to Council's Dog Control Policy)
 within 1 month after receipt of notice of the classification, produce to the territorial
 authority a certificate issued by a veterinarian certifying—
 - I. that the dog is or has been neutered; or
 - II. that for reasons that are specified in the certificate, the dog will not be in a fit condition to be neutered before a date specified in the certificate; and
 - iii. must, if a non-neutering certificate is produced to the territorial authority, produce to the territorial authority, within 1 month after the date specified in that certificate, a further certificate that the dog has now been neutered.
- 28. A menacing classification extends to the whole of New Zealand and remains in place for the life of the dog.
- There is no provision under the Dog Control Act 1996 to appeal this decision to the district Court.

Council's Dog Control Policy - Neutering of dogs classified as menacing:

- 30. Council's Dog Control Policy provides direction on how Council will fulfil its legislative responsibilities pursuant to the <u>Dog Control Act 1996</u> and the Dog Control Bylaw.
- 31. The <u>Dog Control Policy</u> requires mandatory neutering of dogs classified as menacing in accordance with the provisions of the <u>Dog Control Act 1996</u>. Mandatory neutering also includes dogs <u>classified</u> as menacing by other territorial authorities where that dog is in the jurisdiction of Hamilton City Council.

Right to make an objection

- 32. Section 33B provides a dog owner with the right to object to the classification. If a dog is classified under section 33A as a menacing dog, the owner:
 - may, within 14 days of receiving notice of the classification, object in writing to the territorial authority in regard to the classification; and
 - ii. has the right to be heard in support of the objection.
- 33. The territorial authority considering an objection under subsection (1) may uphold or rescind the classification, and in making its determination must have regard to
 - i. the evidence which formed the basis for the classification; and
 - any steps taken by the owner to prevent any threat to the safety of persons or animals; and
 - iii. the matters relied on in support of the objection; and
 - iv. any other relevant matters.
- 34. The territorial authority must, as soon as practicable, give written notice to the owner of
 - i. its determination of the objection; and
 - ii. the reasons for its determination.

Risks - Tuuraru

- 35. Public safety risk: If a dog owner that should have been classified is not, their behaviour may mean that animals in their possession may continue to pose a potential threat to the public or other animals. This could result in attacks or incidents that cause harm.
- Reputation and perception: Failure to properly classify a dog owner may affect the public perception of Council's approach to enforcement.

Strategic Considerations - Whaiwhakaaro-aa-rautaki

- 37. Everything we do is aimed at improving the wellbeing of Hamiltonians. Council has been working alongside our community to understand what people in our city want the future of Hamilton Kirikiriroa to look like as represented by our five priorities.
- 38. The promotion of the social, economic, environmental, and cultural wellbeing of communities in the present and for the future is expressed through Council's key strategies.
- 39. The proposed recommendation will align with Council key documents, as identified in the Governance Structure, in the following ways.

Significance and Engagement Policy	Staff have considered the key considerations under the Significance and Engagement Policy and have assessed that the matter(s) in this report has/have a low level of significance. Given the low level of significance determined, the engagement level is low. No engagement is required.
Our Climate Future Te Pae Tawhiti o Kirikiriroa	Staff have assessed this option against the <u>Climate Change Policy</u> for both emissions and climate change adaptation. Staff have determined no adaptation, or emissions assessment is required.

Classification of Dog as Menacing Dog Section 33A Dog Control Act 1996

Section 33A of the Dog Control Act 1996 ("DCA") enables Hamilton City Council ("HCC"), to classify a dog that it considers poses a threat to any person, stock, poultry, domestic animal, or protected wildlife because of:

- a. any observed or reported behaviour of the dog; or
- b. any characteristics typically associated with the dog's breed or type.

As a result of the observed or reported behaviour HCC has classified the dog as a Menacing Dog under s33A of the Dog Control Act 1996. The Notice of Classification of Dog as Menacing Dog ("the Notice") is <a href="mailto

HCC requires you to have the dog de-sexed, and to provide a copy of the de-sexing certificate to HCC within one month from the date shown on the Notice.

You may be able to take advantage of discounts available through HCC for de-sexing fees with a contracted veterinarian. Microchipping is also available at the Animal Education and Control Centre. If you would like further information about these services, please contact the Animal Education and Control team on 07 838 6632.

Please ensure that you comply with the requirements of the classification within the timeframes outlined in the enclosed Notice to avoid any further enforcement action. If you do not agree with the Classification you may object in writing within 14 days of receiving the Classification, by emailing dog.registration@hcc.govt.nz

You must have valid ground for an objection and produce evidence that your dog is not of a breed or type listed above.

S 33E(1) Effect of classification as a menacing dog

Sections 33E, 33F, 36A, Dog Control Act 1996

You -

- (a) must not allow the dog to be at large or in any public place or in any private way (other than when confined completely within a vehicle or cage) without the dog being muzzled in such a manner as to prevent the dog from biting but to allow it to breathe and drink without obstruction; and
- (b) must produce to HCC within 1 month after receipt of this notice, a certificate issued by a veterinary surgeon certifying —

- that the dog is or has been neutered; or
- (ii) that for reasons that are specified in the certificate, the dog will not be in a fit condition to be neutered before a date specified in the certificate; and
- must, if a certificate under paragraph (b)(ii) is produced to HCC, produce to HCC, within (c) 1 month after the date specified in that certificate, a further certificate under paragraph (b)(i).

You will commit an offence and be liable on conviction to a fine not exceeding \$3,000 if you fail to comply with all of the matters in paragraphs (a) to (c) above.

A dog control officer or dog ranger may seize and remove the dog from you if you fail to comply with all of the matters in paragraphs (a) to (c) above. The officer or ranger may keep the dog until you demonstrate that you are willing to comply with paragraphs (a) to (c).

You are also required, for the purposes of providing permanent identification of the dog, to arrange for the dog to be implanted with a functioning microchip transponder. This must be confirmed by making the dog available to HCC in accordance with the reasonable instructions of HCC for verification that the dog has been implanted with a functioning microchip transponder of the prescribed type and in the prescribed location.

You will commit an offence and be liable on conviction to a fine not exceeding \$3,000 if you fail to comply with this requirement within 2 months after the dog is classified as menacing.

If the dog is in the possession of another person (for a period not exceeding 72 hours), you must advise that person of the requirement to not allow the dog to be at large or in any public place or in any private way (other than when confined completely within a vehicle or cage) without the dog being muzzled in such a manner as to prevent the dog from biting but to allow it to breathe and drink without obstruction. You will commit an offence and be liable on summary conviction to a fine not exceeding \$500 if you fail to comply with this requirement.

Full details of the effect of the classification of a dog as menacing are provided in the Dog Control Act 1996. This is available to view online at www.legislation.govt.nz.

Right of Objection to Classification Under Section 33C

Section 33D, Dog Control Act 1996

You may object to the classification of your dog as menacing by lodging with HCC a written objection within 14 days of receipt of this notice setting out the grounds on which you object. This objection must be emailed to dog.registration@hcc.govt.nz

You have the right to be heard in support of your objection and will be notified of the time and place at which your objection will be heard.

Purpose - Take

 To seek a determination from the Dog Control Hearings Panel on the classification of Shiva (the Dog) as a menacing dog.

Staff Recommendation - Tuutohu-aa-kaimahi

- 2. That the Dog Control Hearings Panel:
 - a) receives the report; and
 - confirms it has considered the mandatory matters specified under the Dog Control Act 1996, and other matters relevant to the objection; and
 - c) notes that the Dog Control Hearings Panel in determining any objection can only either uphold or rescind the classification under the Dog Control Act 1996; and
 - d) either **upholds** or **rescinds** the menacing classification.

Executive Summary - Whakaraapopototanga matua

- 3. On 2 July 2025 Council received two complaints regarding Shiva (the Dog) a Female, 5 ½ year old American Pit Bull Terrier (refer to **Attachment 1**) rushing a member of the public as they were walking along Kitchener St, Claudelands, Hamilton (refer **Attachment 2**).
- 4. The Dog Control Act 1996 sets out the circumstances in which Council may classify a dog as menacing.
- 5. Staff recommend that the classification of the Dog as menacing is upheld.
- 6. Staff consider the decision in this report has low significance and that the recommendations comply with the Council's legal requirements.
- Staff consider the matter/decision has medium risk(s) associated with the decision(s) required for this matter as outlined in the report.

Background - Koorero whaimaarama

- 8. On 2 July 2025 Council received two complaints (CRM 492482 & CRM 492547) regarding Shiva (the Dog) a Female, 5 ½ year old American Pit Bull Terrier. The Dog is registered to Tracy Queenin (Owner). The dog was last registered for the 2024/25 registration year and is currently unregistered.
- 9. The two reports submitted to Council are for the same event but were assigned to different officers due to the timeframe between which each report was received.
- 10. CRM 492482 was reported at 11.59am, and primarily concerns the Dog, Shiva roaming in the street, having aggressive mannerisms, and that children have come in contact with the dog and had to jump fences. The investigating officer visited the area and spoke to a man who lives in the street and who noted the dog had come on to his section and behaved aggressively towards him (refer to Attachment 2).
- 11. CRM 429547 primarily concerns the Dog, Shiva, rushing a member of the public as they walked along Kitchener St in Claudelands Hamilton at approximately 12pm (mid-day). The complainant reported having to jump a couple of fences to get away from the dog. In doing so they have sustained scratches and bruises to their extremities and general soreness (refer to **Attachment 2**).
- 12. On 24 July 2025 the Dog was classified by staff as menacing. Refer to **Attachment 3** for the Notice of Classification.
- 13. On 8 August 2025 an objection to the classification of the Dog as menacing was received from the Owners. Refer to **Attachment 4** for a copy of the objection.
- 14. As a result, a hearing has been convened to hear the objection. The Hearing Panel should note:
 - i. the Owners have advised that they wish to be heard in person; and
 - ii. the Complainant has advised that they wish to be contacted closer to the hearing date as they may wish to be heard in person.
- 15. The normal order of the procedure of a hearing is as follows:
 - i. opening of the meeting by the Chair;
 - ii. the Objector presents their objection and supporting evidence;
 - iii. any witnesses in support of the objection speak to their evidence;
 - iv. the Complainant and any witnesses in opposition of the objection speak to their evidence;
 - v. Staff summarise the Committee report and makes any comments regarding information provided at the hearing;
 - vi. the Objector has the opportunity to respond to any new matters or points not already covered during the hearing;
 - vii. the hearing is closed or adjourned for a decision to be made.
- 16. For the avoidance of doubt:
 - i. The Chair of the hearing may change the order of the hearing at their discretion.
 - ii. There is **no** opportunity for cross examination at the hearing by any party.
 - iii. Members of the Hearings Panel may ask questions for clarification of the parties during the hearing.

Discussion - Matapaki

- 17. Section 33B provides that in making its determination the Committee must have regard to:
 - i. the evidence which formed the basis for the classification;

- ii. any steps taken by the owner to prevent any threat to the safety of persons or animals;
- iii. the matters relied on in support of the objection; and
- iv. any other relevant matters.

Evidence which formed the basis for the classification

- 18. In deciding to classify the Dog, staff have relied on the following evidence:
 - a. The statement from the complainant who was rushed by the Dog
 - b. A Compliant made by a separate person of the Dog acting aggressively
 - c. During the investigation when speaking to a person who lives in the street, they noted that the dog had gone onto his section and behaved aggressively towards him.

Matters relied on or advanced in support of the objection

- 19. The Owner objects to the classification on the following grounds:
 - a. The complainant could not get over a two-metre fence.
 - b. That their neighbour did not see it.
 - c. There was no harm to woman and child.
 - d. No aggression towards officers.
 - e. Complaint made 3 hours after dog was returned to property.
 - f. Breed of dog.
 - g. Dog goes to day care.
- 20. Refer to **Attachment 3** for the copy of the objection.

Steps taken by the owner to prevent any threat to the safety of persons or animals

- 21. Staff are **not** aware of any further steps taken by the Owner, apart from some repairs to the gate, to prevent any threat to the safety of persons or animals. The Owner may have further information on this matter at the hearing.
- 22. The dog has been desexed.

Other relevant matters

- 23. The Dog Control Act 1996 requires consideration of any other matters that the Hearings Panel considers relevant.
- 24. Council's Dog Control Policy provides direction on how Council will fulfil its legislative responsibilities pursuant to the <u>Dog Control Act 1996</u> and the Dog Control Bylaw. The Hearing Panel should consider whether its decision is consistent with the purposes in the Dog Control Policy, specifically:
 - i. the need to minimise danger, distress, and nuisance to the community generally;
 - ii. the need to avoid the inherent danger in allowing dogs to have uncontrolled access to public places that are frequented by children, whether or not the children are accompanied by adults;
 - the importance of enabling, to the extent that is practicable, the public (including families) to use streets and public amenities without fear of attack or intimidation by dogs;

- iv. the exercise and recreational needs of dogs and their owners.
- 25. Ownership history and recorded dog behaviour can be a relevant consideration if it provides evidence of prior good or poor dog or ownership behaviour. Council has received seven complaints relating to this dog since May 2024, see table below.

Options - Koowhiringa

26. Under the <u>Dog Control Act 1996</u>, territorial authorities have two options when considering an outcome of an objection to a dog being classified as menacing:

Option 1: to uphold the classification; or

Option 2: to rescind the classification.

- 27. There are no other options open to the Dog Control Hearings Panel under the <u>Dog Control Act</u> 1996.
- 28. The staff recommendation is that the Hearings Panel choose **Option 1** and uphold the classification for the following reasons:
 - The complaints about dog Shiva show an escalation in behaviour, from barking, to roaming and most recently roaming and rushing at members of the public and AEC staff believe the Dog poses an ongoing risk to members of the public.
 - One of the effects of a menacing classification is the requirement for the dog to be muzzled while in a public place to prevent it from biting.

Financial Considerations - Whaiwhakaaro Puutea

29. This is a regular operating activity funded through the Long-Term Plan.

Legal Considerations - Whaiwhakaaro-aa-ture

Menacing Dog Classification

- 26. Section 33A of the Dog Control Act 1996 provides that a territorial authority may classify dog as menacing that has not been classified as a dangerous dog under section 31; but a territorial authority considers may pose a threat to any person, stock, poultry, domestic animal, or protected wildlife because of
 - i. any observed or reported behaviour of the dog; or
 - ii. any characteristics typically associated with the dog's breed or type.

Effect of a menacing dog classification

- 27. If a dog is classified as a menacing dog under section 33A the owner of the dog:
 - must not allow the dog to be at large or in any public place or in any private way, except when confined completely within a vehicle or cage, without being muzzled in such a manner as to prevent the dog from biting but to allow it to breathe and drink without obstruction; and
 - ii. must, if required by the territorial authority (refer below to Council's Dog Control Policy) within 1 month after receipt of notice of the classification, produce to the territorial authority a certificate issued by a veterinarian certifying—
 - I. that the dog is or has been neutered; or
 - II. that for reasons that are specified in the certificate, the dog will not be in a fit condition to be neutered before a date specified in the certificate; and
 - iii. must, if a non-neutering certificate is produced to the territorial authority, produce to the territorial authority, within 1 month after the date specified in that certificate, a further certificate that the dog has now been neutered.

- A menacing classification extends to the whole of New Zealand and remains in place for the life of the dog.
- There is no provision under the Dog Control Act 1996 to appeal this decision to the district Court.

Council's Dog Control Policy - Neutering of dogs classified as menacing:

- 30. Council's Dog Control Policy provides direction on how Council will fulfil its legislative responsibilities pursuant to the <u>Dog Control Act 1996</u> and the Dog Control Bylaw.
- 31. The <u>Dog Control Policy</u> requires mandatory neutering of dogs classified as menacing in accordance with the provisions of the <u>Dog Control Act 1996</u>. Mandatory neutering also includes dogs <u>classified</u> as menacing by other territorial authorities where that dog is in the jurisdiction of Hamilton City Council.

Right to make an objection

- 32. <u>Section 33B</u> provides a dog owner with the right to object to the classification. If a dog is classified under section 33A as a menacing dog, the owner:
 - i. may, within 14 days of receiving notice of the classification, object in writing to the territorial authority in regard to the classification; and
 - ii. has the right to be heard in support of the objection.
- 33. The territorial authority considering an objection under subsection (1) may uphold or rescind the classification, and in making its determination must have regard to
 - i. the evidence which formed the basis for the classification; and
 - ii. any steps taken by the owner to prevent any threat to the safety of persons or animals; and
 - iii. the matters relied on in support of the objection; and
 - iv. any other relevant matters.
- 34. The territorial authority must, as soon as practicable, give written notice to the owner of
 - i. its determination of the objection; and
 - ii. the reasons for its determination.

Risks - Tuuraru

- 35. Public safety risk: If a dog owner that should have been classified is not, their behaviour may mean that animals in their possession may continue to pose a potential threat to the public or other animals. This could result in attacks or incidents that cause harm.
- 36. Reputation and perception: Failure to properly classify a dog owner may affect the public perception of Council's approach to enforcement.

Strategic Considerations - Whaiwhakaaro-aa-rautaki

- 37. Everything we do is aimed at improving the wellbeing of Hamiltonians. Council has been working alongside our community to understand what people in our city want the future of Hamilton Kirikiriroa to look like as represented by our five priorities.
- 38. The promotion of the social, economic, environmental, and cultural wellbeing of communities in the present and for the future is expressed through Council's key strategies.
- 39. The proposed recommendation will align with Council key documents, as identified in the Governance Structure, in the following ways.

Classification of Dog as Menacing Dog Section 33A Dog Control Act 1996

Section 33A of the Dog Control Act 1996 ("DCA") enables Hamilton City Council ("HCC"), to classify a dog that it considers poses a threat to any person, stock, poultry, domestic animal, or protected wildlife because of:

- a. any observed or reported behaviour of the dog; or
- b. any characteristics typically associated with the dog's breed or type.

As a result of the observed or reported behaviour HCC has classified the dog as a Menacing Dog under s33A of the Dog Control Act 1996. The Notice of Classification of Dog as Menacing Dog ("the Notice") is enclosed.

HCC requires you to have the dog de-sexed, and to provide a copy of the de-sexing certificate to HCC within one month from the date shown on the Notice.

You may be able to take advantage of discounts available through HCC for de-sexing fees with a contracted veterinarian. Microchipping is also available at the Animal Education and Control Centre. If you would like further information about these services, please contact the Animal Education and Control team on 07 838 6632.

Please ensure that you comply with the requirements of the classification within the timeframes outlined in the enclosed Notice to avoid any further enforcement action. If you do not agree with the Classification you may object in writing within 14 days of receiving the Classification, by emailing dog.registration@hcc.govt.nz

You must have valid ground for an objection and produce evidence that your dog is not of a breed or type listed above.

- (ii) that for reasons that are specified in the certificate, the dog will not be in a fit condition to be neutered before a date specified in the certificate; and
- (c) must, if a certificate under paragraph (b)(ii) is produced to HCC, produce to HCC, within 1 month after the date specified in that certificate, a further certificate under paragraph (b)(i).

You will commit an offence and be liable on conviction to a fine not exceeding \$3,000 if you fail to comply with all of the matters in paragraphs (a) to (c) above.

A dog control officer or dog ranger may seize and remove the dog from you if you fail to comply with all of the matters in paragraphs (a) to (c) above. The officer or ranger may keep the dog until you demonstrate that you are willing to comply with paragraphs (a) to (c).

You are also required, for the purposes of providing permanent identification of the dog, to arrange for the dog to be implanted with a functioning microchip transponder. This must be confirmed by making the dog available to HCC in accordance with the reasonable instructions of HCC for verification that the dog has been implanted with a functioning microchip transponder of the prescribed type and in the prescribed location.

You will commit an offence and be liable on conviction to a fine not exceeding \$3,000 if you fail to comply with this requirement within 2 months after the dog is classified as menacing.

If the dog is in the possession of another person (for a period not exceeding 72 hours), you must advise that person of the requirement to not allow the dog to be at large or in any public place or in any private way (other than when confined completely within a vehicle or cage) without the dog being muzzled in such a manner as to prevent the dog from biting but to allow it to breathe and drink without obstruction. You will commit an offence and be liable on summary conviction to a fine not exceeding \$500 if you fail to comply with this requirement.

They stated they then ran down the with Shiva chasing them and jumped more fences between numbers See photos.

Flaws and discrepancies in complainant account and neighbours who were home and assisted shiva:

1)Why would they jump back over the fence from inside my property if Shiva was on the road side?

2)Stretch of road 32 meters. Shiva is fast and catches my 18 year old 6'3" athlete in seconds.

3)all fences are 2 meter high mine and other properties 4)no witnesses 5)my next door neighbour was walking back home from the saw shiva no one around. Did not see event yet was on the road. No harm to woman and child 6)neighbour texted me at 12:30 reported her out and put her back in my yard. Neighbour did not hear any barking or witness shiva chasing anyone.

7) officers arrived during this - zero aggression towards officers 8) see letter from neighbour 9) complaint was made 3 hours after shive returned to property.

b) breed of dog- shiva has not been categorised as breed type Pitbull terrier Vet that cares for her needs, performed microchip and desexing described her "mixed breed "Officers are not qualified to over rule a veterinarians professional judgment or state type of breed on their assumptions.

Shiva goes to doggy day care and has no problem with interaction with other dogs. We regularly have people at home with no issues.

Shiva is protective at the gate barking. I acknowledge the gate fault and have made it a priority to replace/repair. Photos and letter to follow in separate file/email.

We have a young son who interacts Shiva through the gate and has never given us concern.



As the registration was completed online all the details are as entered by the dog owner.




