The meeting was opened with karakia from Tame Pokaia.

1. Apologies – Tono aroha

Resolved: (Cr Wilson/Cr Thomson)

That the apologies for absence from Cr Hamilton and for lateness apologies from Cr Pascoe are confirmed.

2. Confirmation of Agenda – Whakatau raarangi take

Resolved: (Mayor Southgate/Cr van Oosten)

That the agenda is confirmed.

3. Declarations of Interest – Tauaakii whaipaanga

No members of the Council declared a Conflict of Interest.

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4. Public Forum – AAtea koorero

Not required.

5. Engagement Response to the draft 2022-23 Annual Plan budget

Raymond Mudford

Mr Mudford spoke to his submission, noting his support for the establishment of Community Boards that could advocate for better services in older neighbourhoods, upcoming wastewater plant development, the rising cost of living, and the need for Council to cut debt and spending. He responded to questions from Members concerning wastewater plant development, and community funding of projects.

Roger Stratford

Mr Stratford spoke to his submission, noting his support for the Annual Plan, further funding of climate change initiatives, and a focus transport development for private automotive transport. He responded to questions from Members concerning private automotive transport contributing to climate change.

Phil Evans (Bike ACTION Waikato)

Mr Evans spoke to his submission, noting the urgency needed to increase safety for cyclists on existing transport networks. He responded to questions from Members concerning funding in the Long Term Plan, and on road vs off road bike lanes.

Councillor Angela Strange and Mark Tamura (Waikato Regional Council)

Cr Strange and Mr Tamura spoke to their submission, noting the collaborative work between Hamilton City Council and Waikato Regional Council, transport congestion, increase in public transport funding, and the Te Huia passenger train supporting local public transport. They responded to questions from Members concerning central government public transport funding, and boundaryless planning for public transport.

Tony McLauchlan (Porter Group)

Mr McLauchlan spoke to their submission, noting his support for development of Onion road infrastructure, the designation of the land by Council, and the Long Term Plan funding timeline of the development. He responded to questions from Members concerning Long Term Plan funding, timeline of the project, and a Private Development Agreement.

Constance Phu (New Zealand Chinese Language Week Charitable Trust)

Ms Phu spoke to their submission, noting the work of the New Zealand Chinese Language Week Charitable Trust in 2021, and requested for further support from the Council.

Simon Gascoigne (GoEco)

Mr Gascoigne spoke to their submission, noting support for the transport objectives in the annual plan, public transport initiatives, and spoke in support of maintaining heritage trees and wildlife ecosystems. He spoke of the need for new wastewater treatment plants to be able to keep up with demand to avoid river pollution, and thanked the Council for their support of the Ukraine.

The meeting was adjourned from 10.38am to 11.15am.

Melissa Smith

Ms Smith spoke to her submission, noting her support for increased funding for cycling and micro mobility projects and the need for increased safety measures. She responded to questions from Members concerning bike lane obstructions, and quality of cycleways.

Lynne Garnham (Tui 2000)

Ms Garnham spoke to her submission, noting work completed by Tui 2000 to date. She spoke to the development of the Hamilton Zoo and Waiwhakareke entrance, upgrades in infrastructure at Waiwhakareke, and environmental projects. She responded to questions from Members concerning environmental objectives funded in the Long Term Plan, and Tui 2000 membership.

Blair McAlister

Mr McAlister spoke to his submission, noting his concern with increased spending in the Long Term Plan and Annual plan, renaming of roads, infrastructure development, and Council debt. He responded to questions from Members concerning clearing stormwater drains.

Deputy Mayor Taylor left the meeting (11.45am) during the above submission.

Chris Ford & Gerri Pomeroy (Disabled Persons Assembly NZ Inc)

Mr Ford and Ms Pomeroy spoke to their submission, noting their desire for Council to continue to support the disability community to ensure all people can live with dignity in the city. They recommended that the Council fund development of accessibility objectives, and spoke of the work of Disabled Persons Assembly NZ Inc, Councils involvement, and infrastructure that supports the accessibility community. They responded to questions from Members concerning Councils support of the Disabled Persons Assembly NZ Inc, the Disability Action Plan, and accessibility considerations in development projects.

Cr Pascoe joined the meeting (11.56am) via Audio Visual link during the above submission.

Deputy Mayor Taylor re-joined the meeting (11.57am) during the above submission.

Richard Porter (Bike Waikato)

Mr Porter spoke to his submission, noting the need for road safety to be increased to allow children to get to school safely via alternative transport options, rather than just private vehicles. He spoke of the need to retrofit micro mobility transport links, and to proactively build micro mobility links in new developments. He responded to questions from Members concerning transport expenditure by transport type,

Cr Pascoe left the Audio Visual meeting and attended the meeting in person (12.06pm) during the above submission.

Jeremy Mayall (Creative Waikato)

Mr Mayall spoke to their submission, noting the importance of arts and culture in creating inclusive and vibrant communities. He spoke of art and culture events, placemaking through infrastructure, funding in the annual plan, collaboration between Council, the community, and Mana Whenua, the development of the Waikato Regional Theatre, community wellbeing, and the increased economic activity by encouraging artists to work in Hamilton. He responded to questions from Members concerning role of art culture in community wellbeing, community feedback, funding opportunities, collaboration with other community groups, support of budgeting proposals, and concern of existing organisations applying for new community grants.

Gurpreet Bagga (Residents of Flagstaff)

Mr Bagga spoke to his submission, noting noise pollution being experienced in Flagstaff as a result of development and the road material, and spoke to road safety features needed on River road to lower traffic and allow people to cross roads more safely. He responded to questions from Members concerning noise pollution decreasing as development in the area decreases, and current safety measures.

The meeting was adjourned from 12.40pm to 1.40pm.

Following the above verbal submissions, Elected Members requested the following information and matters be included in the Deliberations report and actions for staff to take:

- detail regarding the scope and funding to develop a school travel plan;
- communication with the New Zealand Chinese Language Week Charitable Trust regarding grant funding;
- Cycle infrastructure including cycle wand installation, other cycle safety features, cost, possible methods for Council to keep cycleways clear, and current spend allocation on projects, quality of upkeep in cycle lanes;
- communication with infrastructure development companies to avoid blocking cycle lanes;
- speed bump effect on traffic speed;
- River road safety considerations and communication with the public;
- costs and benefits of the deficit in funding in the current Annual plan;
- implementation, funding and use of the Disability Action Plan;
- differences between individual and organisational submissions;
- encouragement for stakeholders to submit; and
- Council borrowing capacity.
